GREAT BRUTALITY

Chinese Boxers Massacred in Cold Blood by Germans.

The latter write home telling how the victims were first made to dig their own graves.

Berlin, Nov. 2.—Considerable impatience at the meagreness of the news from China is finding expression here. The inference is that German censorship over such information is very strict. Letters from privates in China begin to find their way into the Social-Democratic papers, showing that the German troops give no quarter. The Bremen Burger Zeitung publishes a letter from a soldier in Peking, who said he witnessed the following scene:—"Sixty-eight captives, some of them not yet adults, were tied together by their pig tails, beaten bloody by the Germans, compelled to dig their own graves and then shot en masse." The Halberstadter Volks Zeitung prints a communication from Peking, in which the writer says:—"No prisoners are taken. All are shot or preferably sabred to save ammunition. On Sunday afternoon we had to bayonet 74 prisoners. They had killed one of our patrolmen. An entire battalion pursued them and captured 74 alive. It was cruel. It was indescribable."

BOOTH WILL COME.

The Founder of Salvationists to Take Charge in America Shortly.

New York, Nov. 2.—Gen. William Booth, commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army, is coming here next September to take practically the control of the Salvation Army in the United States for at least six months. This announcement was made last night by Commander Booth-Tucker, who arrived from England on the steamer Teutonic. He went there early in October to invite the General to come over and assist in the solution of problems which the Salvation Army is endeavoring to solve. One of the chief problems, he said, was that of organizing and maintaining the farm colonies which the Army is establishing in some of the states. When asked as to the rumor that he was to be transferred to some other command, Commander Booth-Tucker said he knew nothing of it.

YANKEE TACTICS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Will Adopt Them and Speak From a Train.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is going to copy the methods of presidential candidates in the United States, and with the aid of a special train he will deliver over a dozen short speeches in Ontario on Monday next, and another dozen on Tuesday, touching at least 20 constituencies in the two days' tour. The meetings in each case will take the form of a speech from the platform of the Premier's car. On Tuesday Sir Wilfrid will return to Ottawa to await the result of the contest there.

WAS IT A MURDER?

Strange Case of Millionaire Rice in New York.

Jones, the Valet, Reported to have Confessed—Then He Attempted Suicide.

New York, Nov. 2.—The death of the wealthy Wm. Marsh Rice at his Madison Square Ave. apartments on Sept. 23; the attempt of his New York attorney, Albert T. Patrick, to cash checks for large amounts which purported to be signed by the millionaire; the refusal of one bank to cash the checks drawn on it, and the discovery by the bank officials that Mr. Rice was lying dead at the time the checks were presented; the subsequent claim by Patrick that Mr. Rice had made him by will the trustee of the estate, which amounts anywhere from three to eight millions; the charge of forgery both as regards the checks and the will, placed against Patrick and Mr. Rice's valet, Charles E. Jones; the arrest of Patrick and Jones, and their lodgment in jail, with the developments of yesterday, promises to become the most celebrated of the many celebrated crimes which the courts of this city have been called on to investigate. The first incident, which led up to today's climax was the fact disclosed yesterday that the valet Jones had been taken to the district attorney's office, and the subsequent rumor that he had made a confession to the authorities. Before the public had time to learn if the report of confession were true, came the more startling news that during the silent hours of the night Jones had, in his cell in the Tombs, attempted suicide by cutting his throat with a razor. A knife given him, he says, by Attorney Patrick, also confined in the Tombs. That portion of the confession which has to do with the last moments of Mr. Rice is the following, given out by the authorities as coming from Jones: "Rice said: 'I am very nervous, Mr. Patrick. I wish you wouldn't trouble me, please go away.' Patrick replied: 'I have some suits here, Mr. Rice, that will cure your nervousness.' He produced a little bottle and uncorked it. The contents smelled to me like some very strong liniment. Mr. Rice said to me: 'Get me a towel and a sponge.' I got him both. Then Patrick said: 'Jones, you have to leave.' 'I left. As I was leaving Patrick said: 'I remain here until Mr. Rice gets to sleep.' He closed the door behind me. I stood in the hall for a few minutes, and soon I heard Mr. Rice laugh. I thought this was queer, so I pushed open the door and saw Mr. Rice lying on his back in bed. The towel that I had given Patrick was wrapped around the sponge in a cone shape. This cone was lying directly over Mr. Rice's eyes. I saw that Patrick was pressing it down with his right hand. Patrick did not see me, and, of course, Mr. Rice could not. After feeling what I had seen I went and lay on my bed. Mr. Rice grew very sick. Patrick said to me: 'Go, get a doctor.' I went for one. He pronounced Mr. Rice dead."

Although the police were unable to locate Thomas E. Kilroy, the Conservatives promised that he would appear at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon to answer to the charge of criminal libel brought by R. F. Sutherland. Ten minutes before the appointed time Kilroy made his appearance, accompanied by his solicitor, J. W. Hanna. Hanna read a statement in which he alleged that Sutherland had written and signed a circular to Kilroy. The defendant entered no plea and the case was set down for to-day. The defendant was released on \$1,000 bail, half by himself and half by Joseph Durocher of Sandwich west.

The charge against Kilroy had the effect of warming up the political pot. It has also influenced betting and even money is now offered on either candidate. Last night George Taylor, of Chatham, flashed a wad at the Manning house and offered \$100 even on White. Two bystanders took \$25 and Taylor wandered off to find more subscribers. During the evening his absence several men appeared to get a bet down.

Some other bets are:—Ed Glasco bet W. J. Pulling \$60 to \$200 on Sutherland. John Wigle bet \$100 to \$200 on White and bet \$200 even that Sutherland would not get 100 majority in the city. Wigle has also \$200 on that Wigle is elected in South Essex. Gow Watson has \$200 with Delos Davis that Cowan is elected in South Essex.

BACK FROM KLONDIKE

G. H. D. Sutherland, of Windsor, Tells of Nuggets of Gold.

G. H. D. Sutherland, of Windsor, has returned from the Klondike, where he went last August in the interests of the Klondike Pacer Mining & Development Co. of Windsor. Mr. Sutherland spent the greater portion of his time while away at Atlin, British Columbia, a town about 1,000 miles north of Vancouver.

"It is a very mining camp," says Mr. Sutherland. "Laborers are scarce, there and the cost of living very low, averaging 75 cents per day. They have been finding some large nuggets, one of the largest weighing nearly 50 ounces and was almost pure gold. It was worth about \$900 as gold, and much more as a curiosity."

Mr. Sutherland is congratulating himself on having escaped what might have been a serious accident, on his way home. He was travelling on a train over the Great Northern railway and a landslide brought a great mass of earth and boulders down into the pass in the Cascade range, through which the train was to have passed. The train was somewhat behind time, otherwise it might have been caught beneath the mass.
