## THE PRIESTS DENOUNCE IT

Birrell's Irish Measure Opposed By Catholic Church

Bishop Of Limerick Describes It As A "Grotesque Measure"

London, May 15.—The opinion in the lobbies of the House of Parliament on the prospects of the Irish Council bill, which is designated to meet the demands for Irish home rule, has taken a very pessimistic turn because of the growing belief that the Nationalist convention, which is to be held in Dublin May 21 and 22, will not accept the bill.

During the last few days Irish Catholic prelates have come out strongly in denunciation of the project. The Bishop of Limerick describes it as "a grotesque measure," while Archbishop Walsh says: "The bill seems to be all around that I will find difficulty in saying anything to induce the convention to approve it." They are supported by Cardinal Vogue, primate of all Ireland, and the lead given by these prelates is particularly fatal, as practically every parish priest in Ireland will be a delegate to the convention. The Nationalist revolt is being assiduously stimulated by Timothy W. Healy, William O'Brien and other politicians. It is believed Mr. Birrell is willing to amend in the direction of modifying the Lord-Lieutenant's power of veto, and increasing the Government allowance from \$3,250,000 to \$5,000,000.

### FIRE AT LONDON ASYLUM.

Flames Checked Before Lives of Patients Were Endangered.

London, May 15.—Damage to the extent of \$5,000 was done by fire at the London Asylum for the insane yesterday. The fire broke out between six and seven o'clock in the drying room of the laundry, and before it was extinguished the roof and the upper floor were completely destroyed. Good work by the fire department of the institution prevented the flames spreading to the adjoining buildings in which were over 1,000 inmates. No trouble whatever was experienced. The fire originated among the wooden drying racks.

## FORTY SAILORS WERE LOST

Two St. Pierre Fishing Boats Are Long Missing

Believed To Have Gone to Bottom—Fatherless Children

Halifax, May 15.—News comes from St. Pierre Miquelon of what is believed to be one of the greatest tragedies in the history of the unfortunate French colony at the entrance of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Two fishing vessels, carrying crews totalling forty men, are believed to have gone to the bottom in the storms of April. On April 3 last four schooners fully manned, left St. Pierre for the fishing banks. Among the number were La Blanche, Captain Girardin, and Ste. Marie, Captain Lafleche. Since then nothing has been heard of these vessels or their crews. The other two craft returned shortly after their departure, having encountered severe storms, in which all their gear was lost. After effecting repairs both vessels again started for the banks, but were a second time overcome by the storms and compelled to return to St. Pierre in a greatly damaged condition. It is feared that both La Blanche and Ste. Marie foundered in one of these storms with all hands. If these fears are well-founded forty men, all of whom were married, have perished. It is said that one hundred children will be left fatherless. Scarcely a season passes without disaster overtaking the French fishing fleet operating from St. Pierre. Many of the fishermen come annually from France to prosecute the industry, bringing their families with them.
