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ROYAL REGIMENTAL RECEPTION AT WALLACEBURG'S CELEBRATION

Magnificent Dominion Day Doings at the Glass Town--Men of the 24th Were Handsomely Entertained--Cheers for Mayor Dundas and the Good Town.

The bugles early sounded "God Save the King" and the band played "The British Grenadiers" and a gay-hearted and gay-coated crowd of soldiers assembled to the summons in preparation for the trip of the 24th Kent Regiment to Wallaceburg.

This holiday outing had been looked forward to for some time and everybody was light-hearted and happy in anticipation. Detective McGregor was present to see that everybody was properly equipped for marching. After Col. Rankin had addressed his command and requested each man not to do anything to disgrace the Regiment, marching orders were given and the entire regiment and bands debouched from the Park, and advanced on the C. P. R. station.

Orders had been given to take the train, and the soldiers were anxious to do so, but there was no train to take. The conductor of the special troop train had departed without the troops. Surgeon Dr. Tye was the only soldier known to be on board and he was at once accused of running off with the train. The Surgeon very much out of breath at this juncture and at once denied the accusation. He said the enemy, the train, had tried to capture him and had actually run off with him as far as the distance where he had escaped. The conductor had absolutely refused to return to wait for the soldiers. The Surgeon was commiserated with on his narrow escape. Then began a wait of nearly two hours at the P. C. R. station, while the special train passed. It was headed there and brought back.

The bands enjoyed proceedings of the wait. The Regiment is the only one of its kind in the West. The bugle band were out 85 strong and made a splendid showing. No wonder Col. Peters praised that crack organization and its excellent leader, Major Major Plumbridge. The Wallaceburg people were loud in their praise of the bugle band yesterday and well they might be. Bugle Major Plumbridge deserves the credit for bringing the band up to its present state of efficiency. The brass band is a very good organization of which any one might be proud. Under the direction of Bandmaster W. Avo, the band is rapidly improving and promises to be a first-class organization of the future. "Persepolis" is the name of this band which ever takes the services of this splendid organization.

It was nearly 10 o'clock before the special train got back and it was after eleven before the regiment reached Wallaceburg. The trip by rail was pleasant and uneventful. Arrived at Wallaceburg, a cordial welcome was extended to the soldiers. Horses were provided at the station for the officers. Dr. Tye didn't bring his saddle. He said he preferred to walk. The Wallaceburg people wanted to find out if the officers of the 24th Regiment could ride as well as their reputations credited them with being able to do. So they sent down a fiery aggregation of steeds for the officers to ride. Dr. Tye noticed this so he is accused of sliding over to the engine and getting him to test his wheels and hot steam just as the soldiers got nicely mounted. There was a general stampede and rearing of the horses but the officers fortunately are all good riders. They have Continued on 8th Page.

MEN OF 24TH ON INSPECTION

Colonel Peters Expresses Himself as Well Pleased With Their Appearance And Work.

Although this--their fourth year--is the critical one for the 24th Regiment, when the ranks are again filled by scores of recruits for the third year term, the young soldiers, passing a very creditable inspection from Col. J. Peters, D. O. C., on Thursday evening.

"I am much pleased with the work of the Regiment generally," said the D. O. C. at the conclusion of the inspection. "I like the style and spirit shown by the men of this Regiment. Their drill is not yet perfect, but there is much to commend in the work done. As for your Bugle Band, it is simply the best in the country--and that's all about it."

There was a splendid turnout for inspection. The Regiment, being uniform and polished buttons. They presented a very smart appearance and were complimented thereon.

Under instructions from the D. O. C., Colonel Rankin commanded company officers to inspect the men and the various companies went through the work demanded of them in general good style. Battalion drill followed and the inspection of the corps, after which the "march past" was made.

THE RUSSIANS ARE TRAPPED

Japanese Squadron Found the Vladivostok Fleet in Japan Sea.

Result of Encounter Not Yet Reported--Heavy Losses in Land Fight.

Tokyo, July 2.--Vice-Admiral Kamimura evidently trapped and attacked the Russian Vladivostok squadron off the islands of Tsu, in the southern entrance to the Sea of Japan, last night. The result of the encounter is unknown.

The Vladivostok squadron was reported in the Tsushima straits last night.

London, July 1.--Admiral Skrydloff, according to a dispatch from St. Petersburg to a news agency, here, reports that the Vladivostok squadron has returned to Vladivostok undamaged. The admiral commands the board of the Genoa.

Liao Yang, June 30.--Delayed in transmission--Gen. Kuropatkin with reinforcements personally moved toward Dalin pass, whereupon the pass was evacuated by the Japanese and re-occupied by the Russians.

It is considered probable that the combined armies of Kuroki and Oku will concentrate at Hai Cheng or Kai Chou and await the end of the rainy season. It soon will be impossible to send troops through the passes from the mountains into the valleys.

Che Foo, July 1.--What should prove to be a decisive naval engagement was in progress at 1 o'clock this afternoon midway between Chee Foo and Port Arthur.

The steamer Che Foo, which has arrived here, passed within fifteen miles of the Japanese fleet, consisting of two battleships and five cruisers, all actively engaged. The Russian fleet was not seen, but the distance of the Japanese from land precludes the possibility of any attack on the land batteries. The captain of the Che Foo says he heard a terrific explosion, but was unable to discern whether a Japanese or a Russian ship was affected.

The battle is held here to confirm a Chinese report that only four of the larger Russian warships were at Port Arthur last night.

They were in the road of the big liners and a suit had to be improvised to give steerage way. The waters became rough and washed over the boat, drenching the occupants. In the excitement the motor of the river was missed and the party found themselves at daylight at the St. Clair flats. Home was reached Thursday but the party had their trials. Reg. got all kinds of experience and a coat of tan.
