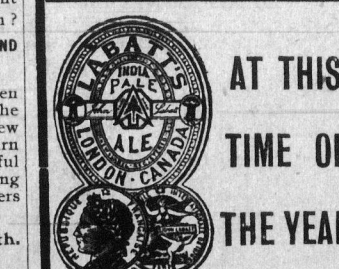

it was contrary to the rules and regulations.

Ald. Austin was of the same opinion. He thought if a last year's alderman had given orders contrary to by-law, that this Council wasn't legally bound to grant the same measure.

Ald. Stone said that he made his resolution purely out of charity. He thought that it was just as fair that these unfortunate Assyrians should be allowed to sell on the market just as well as the blind colored men who sold baskets. It was purely a case of charity to these foreigners who were decidedly in hard luck.

Ald. Austin objected to the putting of the motion, which he said was contrary to the by-law.

Ald. Stone—This man (Ald. Austin) should be the last man in the city to complain of us making legislation breaking the rules. Ald. Austin has held space on the market for years contrary to rules, and his was not by any means a case of charity.

Ald. Massey thought that the poor Assyrians should be privileged to use the market for the balance of the year.

The Council held forth so long on this matter that the Mayor found it necessary to rule it out of order for the meantime.

Ald. Stone objected, but the Mayor was firm and the matter was left over.

The by-law granting the Lake Erie Railway a franchise for 20 years on Kent and Head streets and the Poll Tax were given third readings and finally passed.

YIELDS ON ALL POINTS

Turkey Gives In Unconditionally to Great Britain

NAGLO-TURKISH AFFAIR

Constantinople, May 13.—The Turkish Government has notified Ambassador O'Connor of its full acceptance of the British demands.

Great Britain Satisfied.
London, May 15.—The Anglo-Turkish difficulty has been settled to the satisfaction of Great Britain, the Turkish Government having yielded on all points unconditionally.

Foreign Secretary Grey announced in the House of Commons yesterday that a satisfactory note had been received from the Turkish Government, according to the British demands that a joint commission be appointed to delimitate the Sinai Peninsula frontier.

A Counter Demonstration.
Alexandria, Egypt, May 15.—The British garrison of Alexandria, consisting of infantry and artillery, with bands playing and colors flying, marched through the main streets of the town yesterday and paraded on the big square. The object of this military demonstration was to re-assure and impress the natives who had been somewhat disturbed by the recent Pan-Islamic campaign launched by the supporters of the Turkish action on the Sinai peninsula.

Distrust of Chamberlain.
London, May 15.—The debate in the House of Commons on the education bill has justified the distrust in which a certain section of the Unionist party have always held Mr. Chamberlain. Many Conservatives in voting for his fiscal policy failed to remember that Mr. Chamberlain was Unitarian, and in educational matters not sympathetic with the Orthodox church party. He has now caused consternation by accepting the main principles of the education bill, though with reservations as to Roman Catholic requirements.

Daring Robbery in Winnipeg.
Winnipeg, May 15.—A daring robbery was perpetrated on Main street yesterday afternoon when a man taking advantage of a lull in street traffic, consequent upon a downpour of rain, smashed the window in Henry Birks & Sons' jewelry store and snatched a tray of diamond rings valued at \$7,000. He tripped in his flight and stumbled, losing fifteen of the eighteen rings which the tray contained. These were recovered, but the booty he retained was valued at about \$1,200.

Transferring Their Policies.
London, May 15.—The British policy-holders of the Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York are being organized into rival camps. Those following the plan outlined by the "protection committee," headed by R. C. Haldeman, the former London manager of the Mutual, yesterday flocked to the offices of the North British & Mercantile Insurance Co., where they filed out papers transferring their policies to the British concern.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Ald. Scullard for the Finance committee reported as follows:

1. Re the letters from the assessors for an extra grant of \$20, we recommend no action. We appreciate the work of the assessors. They have made a good showing, but there is a minute on our books to the effect that we will not raise any more salaries this year.

2. Re the petition of Mr. Moorehouse for a reduction of his business tax. No action.

3. Re the proposition from the Electric Railway to give the city \$40,000 of bonds for security for the \$35,000 loan, we recommend no action. We would like to do anything we can for the Railway, but that would be contrary to the by-law.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

Ald. Potter, for the Property committee, recommended that an electric light be placed on the corner of James street and Chatham St.

PARKS AND CEMETERY.

Ald. Stone, for this committee, recommended that Jas. Cormode be granted a rebate of \$1 on a charge made him for a cemetery lot.
