The officials of the line are always anxious to give the best and most regular service possible, and as far as the eastern division between Toronto and Montreal is concerned, have done very well, considering the unprecedented difficulties in the form of cold and snow that they have had to contend with People have become so accusomed during recent years to luxuriously equipped trains running sharp on schedule time? that when under adverse condition, such as have prevailed this winter; there is sometime a little wait at the point of embarkation or delay in reaching their destination they become unreasonable critics, and the officials of the railway, who are doing the best they can, are often most unjustly blamed. The railway companies have nothing to gain by not running sharp on time, but from the way some people talk one would think they were keeping the trains late on purpose.
