Cause of Flat Foot.

The power of the foot as a sustainer of the weight of the body is understood. The heel, great toe, and outer side of the foot form the three points of a tripod. An outward crowded great toe decreases the utility of the foot to just such a degree as it is forced from its normal position. Flat foot is frequently seen in children, as a result of effort made to have them toe out gracefully, says an authority. Toeing in is often due to the unconscious effort to lessen the strain on the arch of the foot, produced by badthe arch of the root, produced by bad-ly formed shoes. Few children will toe in if they wear properly shaped shoes. The exceptions are those with weak foot arches, for whom the shoes should be made with soles thicker on the inner than on the outer edge.
