SUPPRESS THE POACHERS.

If the Canadian and United States authorities work together they can reduce to a minimum the depredations of the Yankee fish poachers. There may be something in the reports sent out from Ottawa of contemplated raids after navigation is officially closed, and it may be the rumors originated in idle gossip around the wharves of Erie, Pa. Wherever there are lawbreakers and robbers there is generally some foolish talk known as 'bluff,' and these reports may be bluff. Whenever it is decided to violate law, there is danger of trouble. If these fish poachers come over to rob our fisheries they should be very vigorously dealt with. Captain Dunn will be justified in sending to the bottom any tug coming within range of his guns; yet a mistake may be made now and again. It is close calculating to tell when his boundary line is reached in case of a chase, but with United States revenue cutters co-operating to punish law-breakers there should be no danger of international complications. The recklessness which has depleted the fish runs on the southern shores of the lakes should not be allowed to obtain on the Canadian side. There are great quantities of fish in Lake Erie, and Canadian fishermen should be fully protected in the possession of what is rightly theirs.

HOW SULPHUR IS MINED FROM A MEXICAN VOLCANO.

Ever since the days of Montezuma, men have been gathering sulphur from the fiery craters of the great Mexican volcano, Popocatepetl. When Cortez arrived, he used the sacred volcano to help him vanquish the Aztecs who worshipped it, by making gunpowder for his soldiers from the crater-sulphur.

The natives are still gathering the sulphur just as the old Aztecs did. Men climb down into the crater, which is filled with dim fires and thick white fumes and break away the masses of sulphur ore. These are thrown into baskets and hauled up to the top by other men.

Then follows the most curious part put on great straw mats lying on the snowy declivity of the volcano. One or two natives leap on it, give a shove with a long pole and off they go, tobogganing down the mountain side till they reach the end of the snow-line. Thence the sulphur is carried on mule back to the railroad.

INDICTMENT AGAINST McLEOD.

But Grand Jury Says Nothing as to Morris Nathan.

Boston, Nov. 13.—The grand jury Saturday reported an indictment against Dr. Percy D. McLeod, in connection with the suit case mystery, charging that he was an accessory after the fact to the abortion which resulted in the death of Susanna A. Geary. McLeod was arraigned, and his bonds increased from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The grand jury failed to indict Morris Nathan of Boston, suitor of the Geary girl, and the first person to be arrested in connection with the case, no mention of the young man being made in its report. There are 25 counts against the persons indicted in the Geary case, the allegations covering different legal phases.

Offered Cash Instead.

Toronto, Nov. 13.—At a meeting of the veterans of 1866 on Friday night, David Creighton reported that Hon. Mr. Cochrane, Minister of Crown Lands, has unofficially offered \$50 to each of the veterans in lieu of the land grant to those who had not located their claim.

Stole \$101,000 and Gets Six Years.

Pittsburg, Nov. 13.—Edward C. Cunliffe, the Adams Express robber, was Saturday sentenced to six years in the Western Penitentiary. Cunliffe was sentenced on two charges of larceny aggregating \$101,000.

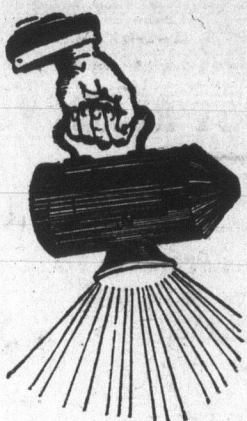

G. A. Holbeck, who moved to Walkerville a year ago, returned to Kingsville last week and will occupy his own residence on Pearl St. West.

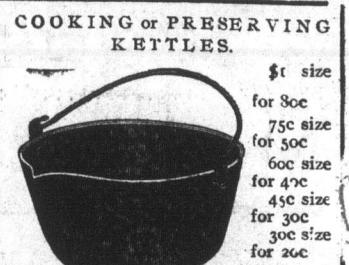
Frank Arnold, who has been here for the last few months in his brother's studio, left Tuesday of last week for Toronto, where he will take a position.
