#### INDICTMENT AGAINST M'LEOD. But Grand Jury Says Nothing as to Morris Nathan.

Boston, Nov. 13.—The grand jury Saturday reported an indictment against Dr. Percy D. McLeod, in connection with the suit case mystery. charging that he was an accessory after the fact to the abortion which resulted in the death of Susanna A. Geary. McLeod was arraigned, and his bonds increased from \$20,000 to

\$25,000. The grand jury failed to indict Morris Nathan of Boston, sultor of the Geary girl, and the first person to be arrested in connection with the case, no mention of the young man being made in its report. There are 28 counts against the persons indicted in the Geary case, the allegations covering different legal phases.
