Not a Natural Product.

One pet claim of liquor sympathizers is that alcohol is a natural product, and a result of natural conditions, and may not properly be condemned for this reason. This was answered clearly and tersely by the Rev. Dr. G. W. Eichelberger, in an address before a teachers' association in Mississippi. Among other things, he said:
There is not one drop of alcohol in nature. Alcohol is produced by decomposition of sugar, by yeast and ferment. And note that the word 'yeast' in the Bible means evil influence. There is no good yeast. So alcohol is itself a decomposition. That is why it will not let anything else decompose which it saturates. It hardens. It is a substance which seems to exist on the border line between the animal and vegetable. I can power to appropriate organic vegetable substances of a different character. In this change heat is produced, carbonic acid gas is given off, and the result is alcohol—the excretion of the process of vegetable change. The poison extracted from this vegetable fermentation is alcohol, and is as poisonous as arsenic.
