**Dominion Parliament**  
OTTAWA, Feb. 29.—Hon. Messrs. Laurier and Foster were in their seats, the latter looking more unwell than the former. Several petitions having been presented, including one by Dr. Macdonald (liberal), praying for a reduction of the number of members by two-thirds. Bowers, of Digby, was introduced by Messrs. Laurier and Fraser. Mr. Northrup, the new member for East Hastings, moved the address in reply to the speech from the throne very eloquently, briefly referring to the first quarter of a century of Canada's history, and to the fact that parliament had now just assembled without the presence of Sir John Macdonald, the father of confederation. He referred to the recent negotiations, and dwelt upon the necessity of the early settlement of the Alaska boundary question, and the advantage of an agreement regarding the salvage of wrecks and towing up the great lake. The correspondence and documents to be submitted would prove, he said, that our ministers had shown an earnest desire for reciprocity and great care to our interests, but would not consent to any discrimination against the mother country.

Every middle aged Philadelphia can remember a wild, picturesque figure that thirty years ago was as familiar a sight to the inhabitants of the Quaker city as the Liberty Bell or the wooden statue of Franklin over the door of his famous library.
