## SERIOUS CRISIS FACING TURKEY

Things Look Bad and Sultan is Furious With Ministers Over Situation.

LONDON, Wednesday.—A special despatch from Constantinople to the Daily Telegraph says that there is not the slightest doubt that Turkey is suffering the greatest crisis in her internal affairs that it is possible to imagine. ## THE PRINCE OF WALES ARRIVED AT QUEBEC YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

Rain Marred Early Proceedings—  
rStreets Lined to View Prince on  
Way to Citadel.

### ADDRESS OF WELCOME

(Special News Service.)  
QUEBEC, Wednesday.—Rain marred the early proceedings of the first important day of the tercentenary fete. The Prince of Wales reached Quebec on the Indomitable at two o'clock and was greeted with salutes from the warships and Citadel.  
Official visits were made His Royal Highness on the Indomitable by the Governor General and Lord Roberts, followed by the Premier of the Dominion, representatives of the United States, France, Lieut. Gov. of the Province, and chairman of the battlefields commission and officers of the military staff in command of the military forces.  
He landed at four o'clock at Kings wharf, where an address of welcome was read by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after which he proceeded to the Citadel, the streets being lined with troops. At a special command of the Prince of Wales, a guard of honor was furnished by the 4th B. C. O. R. of Ottawa, of which the Prince is honorary colonel. They met the Prince at the wharf while the guard for progress through the city, was furnished by the Mounted Police.

### PERSUED BY CROWD

PORTLAND, Ore., Wednesday.—David Conell, chef at the Arlington Club in this city last night shot to death Mrs. Dolly Sharp and a man whose name has not yet been learned. Conell was pursued to his own room, some fifteen or twenty squares distant by a howling mob of several hundred men and boys. Once in his room, Conell turned the key in the face of his pursuers, and before they could force their way in he blew out his brains.  
The cause of the tragedy has not been ascertained, but it is understood Conell had been paying attention to the woman, and he became madly jealous upon learning that she was in the company of another man.

QUEBEC, Wednesday.—One of the notable arrivals yesterday was Hon. J. D. Villiers, chief justice and president of the legislative council of Cape Colony, who represents South Africa at the tercentenary celebration. He stated that he came on behalf of all the states of his country, including Natal, the Orange River Colony and the Transvaal. He comes of a Huguenot Boer family long established in South Africa and since the restoration of political rights he looks to see how a reconstructed South Africa, a federation of states.

Before taking any holiday the members of the Government will put in a couple of weeks steady work in council, and attending to the business of their departments. Sir Wilfrid has not yet made any definite arrangements for the projected series of political meetings in the various provinces of the Dominion.  
Hon. A. R. Aylesworth will save for Vienna at the end of the month, where he will consult the best specialists of Europe. He will probably be absent about six weeks.

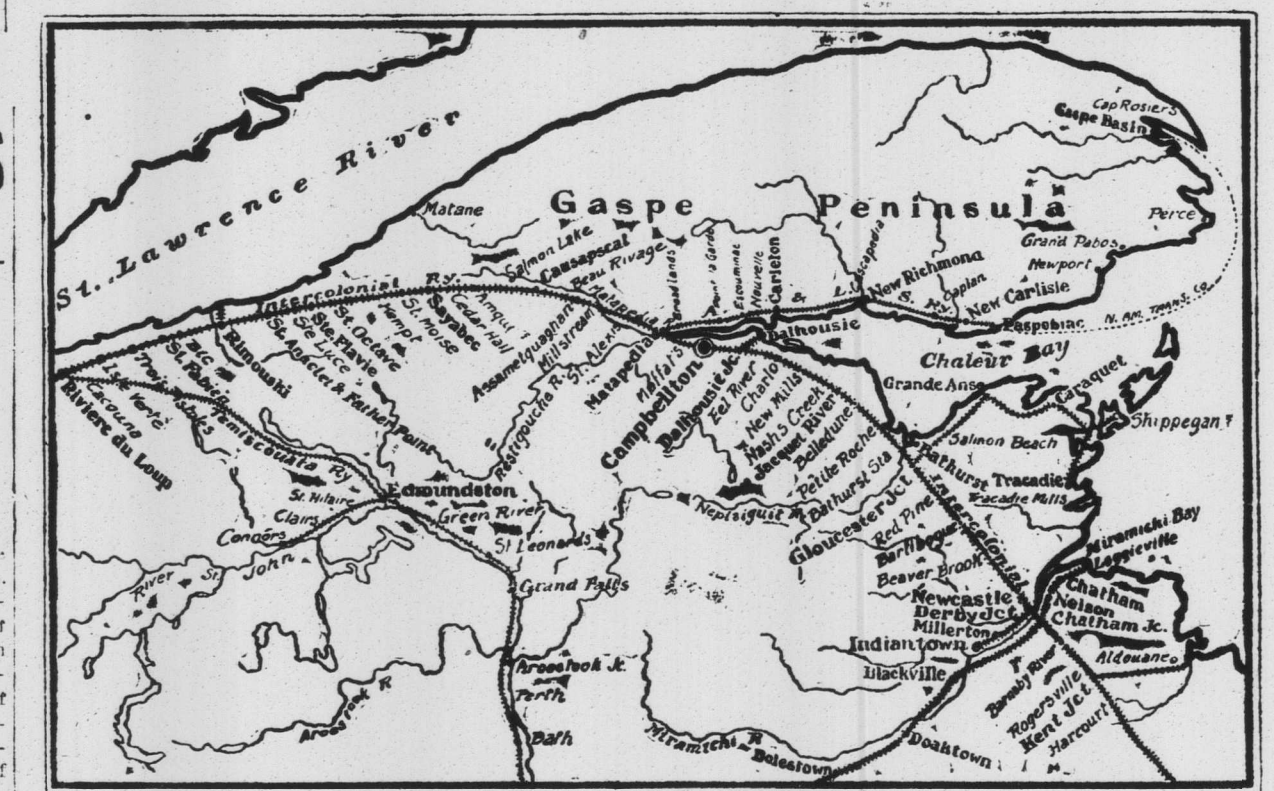

## WILL ESTABLISH AIRSHIP LINE FROM N. Y. TO BOSTON

Will all be Present at Celebration for Some Days.

### NO VACATION YET

BOSTON, Tuesday.—Passengers between New York and Boston will, within eighteen months, be travelling in air ships operated by the American Aerial Navigation Company, according to the announcement by Charles I. Glidden, the automobilist, who has recently become an enthusiastic balloonist. Glidden says the company, permitted to incorporate, which was granted today by the corporation's commissioner, will use either dirigible balloons or aeroplanes. Its purpose will be to manufacture and operate aerial devices and to establish aerial routes for transportation of freight and passengers in the United States, Canada and Mexico. With relay stations at Springfield and New Haven, trips between New York and Boston can be made most of the year within seven or eight hours. Glidden plans to experiment at first with small balloons capable of carrying one or two passengers besides the operator. Stations will be established close to street car lines on the outskirts of cities.
