ALL OPPOSED TO PLACING EMBARGO ON PULPWOOD

Halifax, Oct. 2—Eight Nova Scotia witnesses who appeared here today before the opening sitting of the Royal Commission on pulpwood declared themselves opposed to anything in the nature of an embargo against the export of pulpwood to the United States.

The witnesses were C.W. Anderson, M.P.P., Sherbrooke, Guysboro County, Thomas C. Bateman, Annapolis; Ralph Bell, Halifax; Davidson Hill and Alfred Dickie; Mr. Boutilier, Tusket; B.E. McDonald, Margaree Forks, Cape Breton; Donald McDonald, Briton Cove, C.B.; Ralph Bell, Halifax; gave the following as reasons: pulp mills were not erected in Nova Scotia—Total stand in Nova Scotia was too small. 2—Water powers were inadequate. 3—Timber was scattered and not enough in definite localities to make operations profitable. 4—It was more profitable to maintain plants close to market than to the wood. Mr. Bell suggested for conservation purposes a Dominion forestry commission composed of practical men within the industry and similar controlling bodies in each province with wide powers and scope, the industry paying for the conservation and protection, and having a direct voice in the administration. The commission will sit in Halifax most of this week and will open sittings in New Glasgow, October 8th, in North Sydney, Oct. 11, in Digby, Oct. 13, in St. John, Oct. 15, and in Fredericton Oct. 17.

COMPLAINTS RE BURNED LANDS
From a number of parties complaints were received by the Government that operators holding these leases on lumber lands which had been burned in the forest fires of last spring and summer, although not in position to operate themselves in salvaging fire-killed timber, also had refused to sell stumpage to other who were desirous of operating. The decision reached some time ago was that operators unable to get out the timber must let some one else do it. The Government will give consideration to the matter.

APPEAL IN EXPORT LIQUOR CASE

Hearing of the appeal which has been instituted by the province from the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case of the Provincial Secretary Treasurer vs. the Security Liquor Export Co., Ltd., will not take place before the Privy Council until February.

This appeal which has been brought in order to determine the validity of the New Brunswick Liquor Export Tax Act, and resulted from an action involving some \$60,000, was expected to be heard next month, but owing to the necessity of obtaining the respondent's consent and other delays, the Privy Council hearing will stand over until the February term. The case has already been tried in the Supreme Court of New Brunswick and the Supreme Court of Canada, and a dissenting judgment was rendered in the latter instance. Dr. T. Carleton Allen, K.C., Deputy Attorney General, expects to go to London, when the appeal comes before the Privy Council.

DIRECTORS OF HOME BANK UNDER ARREST

Toronto, Oct. 3—P. J. Daly, president of the Home Bank warrant for whose arrest was issued following the presentation of the report by Curator A.B. Barker is in the custody of a provincial officer at his summer home on Lake Simcoe.

His physician advised the authorities that Mr. Daly was too ill to be moved. The warrant for the president's arrest was taken out by the federal finance department. His bail has been fixed at \$100,000.

R.P. Gough, vice-president of the bank for whose arrest the provincial authorities produced a warrant gave

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himself up here this afternoon. He was released shortly afterwards on \$50,000 bonds. Mr. Gough is on the directorate of a number of large mercantile and financial concerns in this city. J.F.M. Stewart, a director of the bank was arrested at Sunnyside this afternoon on a warrant taken out by provincial authorities. He was with friends at the pavilion when the officer arrived. He was later released on \$100,000 bonds.

F.J.B. Russell and S. Casey Wood other directors were arrested but released on bail of \$50,000 each. C.S. Smith, chief accountant was allowed out on the same bail.

Sydney H. Jones auditor of the Home Bank was arrested this evening at his home at 37 Standish Ave. He has been released on bail of \$25,000, supplied by his wife (\$20,000) and by John Worrell (\$5,000). The bail for C.A. Barnard, Montreal director is fixed at \$100,000 and the bail for Lieut. Colonel Clarence Smith, also of Montreal, at \$50,000.
