OPENING OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

The opening ceremonies of the legislature were marked by all the traditional pomp and dignity which has been associated with the opening ceremonies of past years. There was the customary military display provided by the composite guard of honor, furnished by the York Regiment, No 3 company of the 7th Machine Gun Battalion, and the University of New Brunswick C. C. T. C., under the command of Major John S. Scott, of the York Regiment. The Lieutenant Governor's Salute was fired by a detachment from the 89th Battery, C. F. A., under the command of Major J. D. Winslow, M. C. of Woodstock.

At Parliament Square the Guard was formed up in two ranks immediately facing the main entrance to the legislative building to await the arrival of His Honor Lieutenant Governor Todd. Byrne, as the representative of Gloucester, was introduced by Premier Veniot and Hon. Fred Magee, president of the executive council, while E. A. Kelly, the new opposition member from city, was introduced by C. D. Richards, house leader of the opposition. With the arrival of Lieutenant Governor Todd in his official barouche accompanied by Major George Ked's aide de camp and R. S. Barker, official secretary

the guard of honor presented arms and the band played the first six stanzas of National Anthem. The arrival of the gubernatorial party was also the signal for the commencement of the firing of the Lieutenant Governor's salute. After having acknowledged the compliments, His Honor ascended the steps to the main entrance, where he was received by Col. W. B. Anderson, G. O. C. of Military District No. 7, and Col. H. C. Sparkling, D. S. O., of headquarters staff, and a large escort of officers in uniform. Accompanied by the band and a large escort of officers, His Honor proceeded to the legislative assembly chamber, where he was received by Mr. Speaker Dysart, who, with J. M. Keefe, clerk of the House, and assistant, Clerk J. B. Dickson, then withdrew while his Honor was escorted to the throne, from where he read the speech from the throne. Following the retirement of the Lieutenant Governor with his staff and escort from the assembly chamber, Mr. Speaker Dysart resumed his post as presiding officer of the House and the customary first bill was introduced. Then followed the moving and responding of the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne by W. E. Scully, of Saint John and Col. O. W. Wetmore, of Kings.
