

## Local and Other Items

His Grace Archbishop O'Leary was in Toronto last week attending the episcopal jubilee celebration of Archbishop McNeill.

The British Columbia Legislature has been dissolved and a general election is called. Nomination day will be Wednesday November 10th and December 1st will be polling day.

George Klatt, aged 21, a mail carrier, was arrested in Chicago on the 20th and turned over to the Federal authorities charged with burning political matter sent through the mails, "because it made his pack too heavy." Klatt was arrested in the basement of a schoolhouse, where he was found stuffing speeches of Congressman Rainey, into the furnace.

Three inches of snow fell at Biggar, Sask., on the 19th, and as a result the roads in that district are impassable. Advice of the same date from Maple Creek, Sask., say: A foot of snow has brought joy to the farmers of the district here. With thousands of acres of winter rye in the ground and more being sown, the fall, which commenced Monday, has made the farmers smile. More snow fell yesterday and extended east to near Swift Current.

Three men were killed at 1 o'clock last Wednesday at the plant of the Electric Bleaching Gas Company in Buffalo avenue near Union street, Niagara Falls, N. Y., when one of the tanks used in the process of manufacturing chlorine gas is said to have exploded. The three men killed were Patrick Murray, 50 years old, William Stafford, 49, and Philip Fiora, 40. All were employed in the department where the explosions occurred.

With her rudder head badly twisted, rudder almost gone, and considerable damage on her after deck, the Gloucester fishing schooner Avalon, Captain Ernest Angstrom, arrived at Halifax last Tuesday afternoon from the St. Pierre Bank, reporting a terrific gale there Thursday and Friday last. The blow started Wednesday from the north, gradually working to the northwest, and finally moderating Saturday. One of the men on board said the seas were the worst he has known in a long experience on the coast.

Water-logged with spilt fully set and lifeboats intact, but not a soul on board, the Canadian schooner Adonis drifted ashore opposite Jensen, Florida, and is fast being battered to pieces by the heavy seas. The crew according to a message from Jupiter Lighthouse, was picked up by a passing steamer and saved, though their present whereabouts has not been learned. The Adonis is a three masted schooner owned by Adonis and Company, of Wolfville, N. S. She was built at Bridgetown, N. S. and is in the West Indies trade, being registered at Bridgetown, Barbados.

Swarms of rats made savage by starvation, a means instituted by quarantine officials to eradicate them, have attacked and put to flight a large cat family, it was learned in New York, on the 20th, and otherwise played havoc aboard the steamship "Lorichan," formerly the German liner "Vandalia." After the feline army was gone, the rats attacked the ship's furnishings, luxurious leather cushions, panels and other fittings being gnawed beyond repair. Quarantine officers say the end was in sight. In their battle for life, they declared, the rodents would destroy one another.

An open winter, similar to that of two years ago, is predicted by the Indians of the north country of Ontario. They base their belief on the fact that the beaver, noted for his industry and early provisioning, has not yet begun to prepare his winter quarters. They say that the beaver was similarly dilatory in getting ready for cold weather in the autumn of 1918. The trappers do not indulge in the same cheerful outlook, however. They say there will be heavy snowfalls this coming winter, and they base their belief in the fact that there are more hornets nests than usual in that section of country.

## Canadian-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family of 12 males over 15 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Application must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section a pre-emption. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead and cultivate 50 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$30.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.
