## Cable News.

### Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 22.

An outburst of British pride and gratitude greets what the Morning Post calls the simple, but inspiring naval announcement made in the King's speech at Ottawa. Who, says the Post, could fail to be deeply touched by the spectacle of this young nation resolutely shouldering its responsibilities, as a partner in the Empire, and stepping forward eagerly to take part in safeguarding from attack the heritage of the British race? Contributions from Canada and other partner states must be regarded simply as reinforcements which are intended to render the task of any possible enemy still more formidable. The Telegraph says:—"The heart of the British people will go out in unreserved admiration and deep gratitude to the Canadian nation for its generous promise. Confronted by an emergency of unexampled gravity owing to the rapid expansion of foreign fleets, the Motherland finds she will not have to face the world in arms alone. Offers of help come from all quarters. The ruling princes of the Malay Federated States sprang forward with the gift of a first class armoured ship. New Zealand has given a splendid battle cruiser to the Metropolitan fleet; South Africa is considering what share she will take in shaping the Imperial destinies; Australia is creating a small navy to help the British fleet of the Pacific; and the Empire as a whole, responsibility for policing her distant coasts and seas; Egypt is about to provide mobile defence for her own littoral; and now Canada advances, showing her loyalty to one throne and one flag, and her British conception of a wider life of the allied nations and their mission. This unity carries with it safety to the component parts of the Empire, and peace to the world. We, of the United Kingdom, must be prepared to meet the day of our day with glad welcome. These daughter lands have a right to some voice in shaping the Empire's policy, and we will shrink from this fresh responsibility only at grave peril to the Empire."

LONDON, Nov. 22.  
 The Vienna correspondent of the Times understands that the Triple Alliance will suggest to the other European Powers that Europe, as a whole, should examine the terms of any Treaty of Peace, before its conclusion. The object of this procedure is to avoid calling a European Conference.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 22.  
 It is reported that a Greek squadron has landed troops and taken possession of the island of Mytilene. The Greek commander invited the Turkish Government to demand the flag and the commander surrender within two hours. The Governor asked time to consider, but the request was refused. Troops were landed, but they met with no resistance, the weak Turkish garrison retiring into the interior.

LONDON, Nov. 22.  
 Roumania has communicated to the Austrian Government the main outline of her claims in the Balkan rearrangement. The Austrian Government has accepted the main outline, but Bucharest despatch to the Telegraph, include the rectification of the Dobruja frontier, comprising practically half of the Rastchuk quadrilateral. In the event of the formation of an Albanian State, the whole region between Monastir and Ochrida shall belong to Albania, as the district is populated by people of Roumanian origin, and that they shall be assured of liberty of religion and language. Roumania further demands a concession for a railway between the Danube and the Adriatic Sea, offering to advance the money necessary for its construction and maintenance.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 22.  
 The rejection by Turkey of the condition of the Allies, has been communicated to the Bulgarian Government. One reason for rejection was the opinion held in official circles that the conditions deprived the Turks of the possibility of resuming hostilities in the event of the plenipotentiaries failing to settle terms, and this meant, in effect, no armistice at all. Such conditions are only made when it is a question of the preliminaries of peace. By accepting the terms, Turkey would be binding herself, hand and foot, and her Government insists that Turkey has not sunk to such a degree of impotency as would compel her to accept such conditions. The terms stipulated by the Allies provided for the surrender of Adrianople with its garrison; for the evacuation of Thessaly lines; and for the surrender of Scutari, Durazzo and Debra. No mention was made of Constantinople or the Dardanelles.

SMYRNA, Nov. 22.  
 The French battleship, Jules Ferry, has left for the Mediterranean port. The British battleships, Benbow, Commonwealth, Dominion and Tanian, sailed yesterday to meet four battleships coming from Besika Bay. It is reported that they will proceed together to Malta.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 22.  
 A distinct earthquake shock was felt here and at North Vancouver last evening, over a district of several miles. It occurred at 5 o'clock, lasted six seconds, and appeared to be travelling north and south. No damage is reported.

A GRUDGE.  
 Magistrate to clergyman, summoned for exceeding speed limit: "Well, you say you were only going at 18 miles an hour, and the constable still declares you were travelling at 30. Now, I don't like to doubt either of you. Can you think why he declares you were going at that rate? Is there any grudge he owes you?"
