The Turks are hard put to in Europe. They are striving might and main to retain Adrianople. They are willing to do almost anything to keep this city. The latest report says the chief Plenipotentiary, Rechad Pasha, has offered to have the fortifications of Adrianople demolished on condition that the city is allowed to remain Turkish Territory. The trouble is that with the sea closed against them, the Turks can put up no adequate defence. The condition of the roads and the inefficiency of the railway has caused such a congestion in Turkey in Asia, Syria and Arabia, that these lines of communication are almost useless, and they cannot use the sea for transportation of troops from the chief ports of Asia Minor, and the Levant because the Greeks have the Turkish fleet bottled up in the Dardanelles.

We wonder whether the Government will be as prompt in remitting the fine inflicted on the Fishermen's Union man yesterday at Catalina as they were in releasing Bishop from the Penitentiary for kicking Sir Robert Bond over the wharf at Western Bay in 1909. It is perfectly ridiculous to use a euphemism of Sir Edward Morris in his defence of the Hon. Donald Morrison's Orange Bay letter, to imagine that Ryan remembered the law if he acted as he has been adjudged guilty of doing at Catalina. There is no doubt there was considerable excitement on the wharf at Catalina on the occasion referred to and it would be absurd, as Sir Edward Morris would put it, to hold that he did not forget the law in his excitement, and he should be entitled to as much consideration for his state of excitement as Bishop was by the Hon. Donald Morrison and his colleagues, and to at least as much forbearance as a poor uneducated fisherman for forgetting the law, as the Governor, the Prime Minister and his colleagues extended to the legally well-educated and experienced Attorney General. What is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander.

Coaker and Lloyd are political "gun men," according to the Hon. E. T. McGrath. Thanks, for the acknowledgement. As we showed yesterday, Sir Edward Morris was squealing at Bonne Bay because the Editor of the Telegram had hurt him. But Sir Edward is not the only politician whom our political gun has hit and hit badly. There is the Hon. Donald Morrison. Both have been hit and hurt by the political guns of Coaker and Lloyd. What the fishermen think of both of them now was demonstrated by the condemnatory resolutions passed at Bonavista. McGrath, too, has a gun, but it kicked and hit the gunman, and led to the burning of him in effigy by three thousand fishermen. Morris is making good for an early exit from power. The people are tired of him. They want Sir Robert Bond back to power, and what they want they will insist on having. By the way, our queries

GALVESTON, To-day. The steamer Albanian of the Leyland Line, with a cargo of cotton for Liverpool, went ashore on the beach at Galveston Island last night, in a strong south wind. The ship is believed to be in danger.

LONDON, To-day. The Royal Aero Club is investigating what the Daily Express says "probably the first attempt at aerial murder. Midair Lawrence Santoni, Managing Director of the British Aeroplane Company, has put before the Club allegations of the gravest nature. He states that on three occasions attempts have been made so to damage engines of certain military aeroplanes that would break down while in flight. The outrages, he says, are obviously the work of experts, who they are, how they obtained access to the machine for long enough to tamper with them, what their motives were, whether animosity against a particular pilot or possibly passengers, jealousy of particular aeroplanes, possibly design, against the British Army, are questions which have to be thrashed out by the Royal Aero Club, and possibly by the police.

VIENNA, To-day. A Sofia dispatch says after three requests from the Commander at Adrianople, Bulgarian and Turkish delegates met for the purpose of a supposed discussion on the question of capitulation.
