TO UNDERTAKE PERILOUS TASK.

Regina, Sask., June 11.—To search for the bodies of Harry Radford and H. Street, two explorers and engineers who went into the Polar regions some three years ago, and who are reported to have been murdered by Eskimos, a party of Mounted Policemen under Inspector Bayte will leave Regina about June 20.

It is not yet known how many men there will be in the party, but supplies and equipment must be taken for three years. The task which they are to undertake will be one of the most arduous and probably also one of the most perilous ever embarked upon by members of the famous force of the Northwest.

Sergeant-Major Caulkin, of Maple Creek has been ordered to return to Mounted Police Headquarters here to join the expedition, which will go into the northern wilds. They will commence their investigation in territory adjacent to Chesterfield Inlet. The country which they will have to cover is the bleakest in all Canada. The party will maintain order on Hudson Bay posts, and will also patrol thousands of miles inland.


