### EFFECT OF RUSSIAN SUCCESSES.

LONDON, To-day.

Since the completion of the capture of Pozieres, the news from the British front in France is mainly of artillery actions and testing encounters at various points of the German line. A comparative lull and hot day weather is assumed to have given the Germans an opportunity to bring up further troops and guns, with renewed attempts to recapture Pozieres, where, according to an unofficial report, the British troops have further consolidated their positions. To-night's official report shows that there has been hard fighting all day, with some fluctuating fortune, but that in the end the British improved their positions northeast of Pozieres and in the vicinity of Longueval and Delville Wood. Similarly from the eastern front there is much comment in European capitals on the effect which the loss of the last German offensive in Armenia, from which province the Turks are said to be fleeing owing to the exhaustion of their ammunition supplies, is likely to have upon the Allies; also as to the influence which this defeat, conjoined with the success of the Russians towards Brody, opening the road to Lemberg, will have in Greece and Rumania. The Associated Press correspondent at Athens learns there is no longer any likelihood of an attack upon the Allied forces at Salonika. The Russian War Minister, according to an interview, desires to dispel the illusion that the war can end in the autumn. He admits that German technique is so high that Germany can still offer a long resistance.

### HARD FIGHTING IN WEST.

LONDON, To-day. An official to-night reads: To-day there has been hard infantry fighting northeast of Pozieres and in the vicinity of Longueval and Delville Wood.

### A GERMAN CLAIM.

AMSTERDAM, To-day. A German official statement says that four destroyers have captured two British cargo steamers in international waters off Landakörna, Sweden.

### KAISER FINDS SITUATION SERIOUS.

LONDON, To-day. The Geneva, Switzerland, correspondent to the Daily Express wires, "I learn from Innsbruck that the Austro-Hungarian staff appealed several times during July to German headquarters for assistance against the Russians in Galicia. Small numbers of reinforcements were sent with the statement that it was impossible to send troops during the strong Anglo-French offensive on the Somme. Then the Austrian help appealed directly to the Kaiser, who replied 'When we have beaten the English we shall reconsider the matter, I cannot spare troops at present, as the situation is serious.'"

### Says it's Fine in Hospital

Letter From Corporal W. G. McDonald 3rd London General Hospital, Wandsworth, S. W., July 9th, 1916.

Dear Mother,—Just a line to let you know I am alright and to tell you how I am getting along. I was wounded on the morning of July 1st, about 3.30, the time the Newfoundland Regiment made its assault on the German trenches. I was shot in the left side by a machine gun, and was very lucky; the bullet went right through me.

about three inches above the heart but struck no bone or nerve on the way, with the result it is just a clean wound and I will be out of hospital in a month. I have been up out of bed three days now so you see I am all right; but others of our fellows are not so well off; there are three hundred in this hospital. As I said before I was very lucky. The Germans lost an awful lot of men that day, far more than the British lost. When you write send me some socks, I must have missed the last lot you sent. I don't think I will be here by the time I get an answer to this letter as the wound is nearly healed up now but still I may not get out of hospital until the middle of August. However, here I am in the biggest hospital in London getting well fed and looked after—it's fine, so don't you think I am not all right because I am. I think I have told you all for this time, so no more at present, I will write again soon.
