melting them. In rain there are two things in addition to water which assist this wonderful process. These are nitric acid and carbonic acid, and these are formed in the rain when the oxygen and nitrogen becomes charged with electricity as so often happens during

Of these two acids that slowly eat their way into the rocks, perhaps carbonic acid is the more important. By its action it gradually melts the hard granite upon which the rain falls and so transforms it, first into sandstone and afterwards into sand. Of course this process is. a
