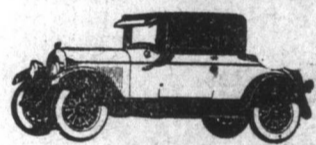

Government Settlement Proposals Accepted by Cape Breton Miners

Termination of Anthracite Wage Scale Negotiations—Britishers' Beer May be Taxed to Pay Coal Subsidy—U.S. Border Patrol Authorized to Check Bootlegging.

DISTRICT 26 ACCEPTS.
 HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 5. With a majority of 1133, the miners of District 26, to-day by referendum agreed to accept the proposal of the Nova Scotia Government to return to work at a wage scale about six per cent. below that of 1924 with a six months' contract and conditional upon a complete investigation of the whole situation to be instituted by the Government and a referendum vote to decide the fate of the check-off system, which is now in vogue in the mines and which the Corporation desires to abolish. A meeting of the directors of the British Empire Steel Corporation, held in Montreal to-day, to decide upon the acceptance or refusal of the proposal, was adjourned to-night, until to-morrow, and no statement was given out.

U. S. ANTHRACITE CONFERENCE BROKEN UP.
 ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., Aug. 4. The Anthracite wage scale negotiations were broken off to-night. The motion to adjourn sine die was proposed by C. J. Golden, President of the District No. 9 United Mine Workers, seconded by several operators and passed by the joint committee. The conferees reported they were in complete disagreement on the miners' demands and that further negotiations appeared useless.

STRATTON TO LEAD FUNDAMENTALISTS.
 NEW YORK, Aug. 5. Leadership of the Fundamentalist forces has been offered to Rev. John Roach Stratton, Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church here and long time modernist. Dr. Stratton said he would challenge Clarence Darrow to a series of debates on evolution.

U. S. FRONTIER PATROL.
 WASHINGTON, Aug. 4. Immediate organization of a force sufficient to patrol 100 miles from the lower Detroit River to Port Hudson to prevent smuggling of liquor, aliens and contraband, from Canada, has been authorized by Assistant Secretary Andrews of Treasury.

BULGARIA ARMY IS READY.
 SOFIA, Aug. 4. Denial has been made by the Foreign Office of any movement by Bulgarian forces as a consequence of the action of Greece in despatching Greek troops to the Bulgarian frontier because of the assassination recently of M. Nicolaidis, a Greek citizen, on Bulgarian territory, because of alleged terrorist acts against Greeks by Bulgarians, but it was declared that the Bulgarian Army is ready to do its duty if called upon.

ABD-EL-KRIM MUST RECOGNIZE THE SULTAN.
 PARIS, Aug. 4. Recognition by Abd-el-Krim of the spiritual authority of the present Sultan of Morocco and his successors is a stipulation in the first clause of the peace terms recently made to the rebellious Moroccan leader by France and Spain.

THE PRICE AT ST. HELENA.
 ST. HELENA, Aug. 4. A guard of honor of British ex-Service men, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and enthusiastic crowds welcomed the Prince of Wales here yesterday when he landed from the battleship Repulse for a short stay on the way from Cape Town to South America. The Prince went to Government House where he received prominent members of the community. Later he visited Longwood where Napoleon was interned and was shown round the estate by the caretaker. The rest of the day included golf, political dinner and dance.

NAVAL ESTIMATES PASSED.
 LONDON, Aug. 4. The House of Commons to-night finally adopted the Government's naval estimates, including the programme for the construction of new warships. The Bill was passed by a vote of 305 to 127 without debate.

M.P. VISITORS TO N.F.L.D.
 LONDON, Aug. 5. (Canadian Press)—Members of the Empire Parliamentary Association, who have made preparations to visit Newfoundland, will leave Liverpool for Quebec on Friday, sailing on the Megantic. This is a change in the original arrangements and in consequence the delegation will not visit the Maritime provinces nearly the close of the tour. David Kirkwood, Labor member of the House of Commons for Dumfriesshire, who was to have been a member of the delegation, is

unable to get away, and his place will be taken by J. J. Lawson, member for Chester-le-Street, Durham. The personnel of the party follows:—Six Conservative M.P.s: Captain H. D. King, J. E. W. 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Watching the Hurricanes

This is the beginning of the season when hurricanes form in the South Atlantic Ocean. This season of storms commonly lasts from June 1 to Nov. 30. These storms form in areas far to the southeast, and travel toward the American coast. They occur with more or less violence in all parts of the coast skirting the Atlantic and sometimes do much damage to shipping. When one of these violent storms hits the coast and travels inland it frequently causes loss of life and great damage to property, sweeping away homesteads as if they were houses of cards.

Since such storms are phenomena of nature, there is no way by which they may be avoided. Nevertheless, thanks to the foresight and skill of the United States Weather Bureau, there is a way to keep track of them, and this the Bureau does by discovering their presence and sending out warnings. There are 100 vessels which co-operate with the Bureau in its work of taking observations of atmospheric conditions on the weather in various parts of the world. These vessels furnish the Bureau with two reports a day, sending them by wireless. These reports tell of weather conditions in the waters in which the vessels may be. They tell the direction and force of the wind and the presence of storms. From a study of such observations the Bureau is able to detect the presence of hurricanes and follow their course.

When such storms are discovered vessels are notified of their presence and are thus able to keep out of their path. Severe storms form in the vicinity of the African coast, traveling thence to the West Indies, Cuba and to the Atlantic coast. Being exceedingly destructive they are responsible for the loss of many vessels. Before the advent of a practical wireless service vessels did not know of the presence of storms until it was too late to seek a safe harbor. Often these storms break with startling suddenness, and vessels are forced to brave them out. Now when a warning is received small vessels remain in port until the storm, if it is a severe one, has blown over.—Morning Chronicle.
