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Art Pelkey will be Next Heavyweight Champion of the World, Says Tommy Burns, His Manager

Former Champion Signs to Manage Chatham Boy—Agreement Somewhat Similar to One He Had With Jack Lester—Tommy will be in Pelkey's Corner at McCarty Contest May 24

Convinced that Art Pelkey is the most promising heavyweight in the ring at the present time, and that this big Canadian boy is destined to be the heavyweight champion of the world, Tommy Burns, the last of the white champions, has undertaken the management of Pelkey, has signed articles with him, and from this time onward the names of Burns and Pelkey will be associated. Burns is to be the manager; Pelkey is to do the fighting.

Ever since Tommy Burns lost the title to Jack Johnson and announced that he would retire from the ring he has been on the lookout for a man who would be the recognized champion of the world. Two years ago he picked up Jack Lester and made him famous. As long as Lester was under the wing of Burns he prospered. He went over to Australia and defeated Bill Lang, the recognized Australian champion. But his prosperity did not agree with him. He repudiated his contract with the former champion, and from that day began to slide down the incline, until now he is back where he started. Less than a month ago he was knocked out by Al Kaufman, who has been defeated by practically every aspiring white hope in the business. Burns and Lester parted company a year and a half ago.
