waters, sailed suddenly on Friday, under waters, sailed suddenly on Friday, under sealed orders, accompanied from Che-Foo by the battleship Victorious, the first-class cruiser Narcissus, the second-class cruiser Hermione, the torpedo boat destroyer Hart and the despatch boat Alacrty. It is supposed that the destination of the fleet is Ta Ku, at the entrance of the river leading to Tien Tsin, the port of Pekin, for the purpose of making a naval demonstration there.

British Consul Protests. British Consul Protests.
Shanghai, Sept. 26.—The British Consul has entered a protest against the action of the Chinese officials in stopping the steamer Eldorado and searching her

for Kang, the Cantonese reformer for Kang, the Cantonese reformor.

It is reported that Admiral Seymour, the British naval commander, contemplates landing a party of sallors and marines at Ta Ku. The Taotai (governor) has asked the assistance of the British Consul in capturing Kang, whom he describes as a degraded criminal. There is no doubt that if he is arrested he will be promptly executed.

London, Sept. 23.—A despatch to the Globe from Hong Korg, published yesterday afternoon, purports to give details of the secret convention signed at Pekin on March 27. It appears that Hau Ying Kiouoi of the Chinese Foreign Office

Kloud of the Chinese Foreign Office thereby concluded an agreement with St. Petersburg by which China ceded Port Arthur and Ta Lien Wan, stipulating that only Russian and Chinese warships enter or dock at Port Arthur.

Russia, it also appears, gets the exclusive use of the inner harbor of Ta Lien Wan, the sole administration of the ceded cerritories, and a tract of land north of Ta Lien Wan is designated as a buffer-belt.

Resigned His Power.

Pekin, Sept. 23.—An Imperial edict just issued definitely announces that the Emperor of China has resigned his power to the Empress (dowager Empress), who has ordered the Ministers to deliver to her, in future, their official reports.

Kang Finds a Refuge.
Shanghai, Sept. 25.—It is reported that Kang Yuwel, the Cantonese reformer, who is accused by the Dowager Empress of being implicated in designs on the Emperor's life, and who recently fled from Pekin, arrived at Woo Sung, near here, on Saturday, and took refuge on board a British gunboat.

RUSSIA OFFERS TROOPS

London, Sept. 26.—A special despatch from Shanghai says that Kang Yuwei's brother has been arrested in Pekin and brother has been arrested in Pekin and condemned to death. The despatch also says that Sir Claude McDonald, the British Minister, gave instructions that Kang Yuwei should be protected from arrest. The British Consulate holds his baggags and documents referring to state secrets. The Russians are incensed at the latter fact and it is reported that Russia has afford the Deveron Engages the services. fact and it is reported that Russia has offered the Dowager Empress the service of 10,000 troops from Port Arthur to keep order in Pekin if necessary. It is stated that the British fleet in Chinese waters has been divided between Ta Ku and Shanghai, under orders to intercept Russian transports in the event of an atternate to land troops. tempt to land troops.

Li Hung's Enemy Arrested.

London, Sept. 26.—The Times' Pekin correpondent says: "Chang Yin Huan, the Cantonese enemy and rival of Li Hung Chang, who is charged with harboring Kang Yuwei, has been arrested. He is now under trial by the Board of Punishment. He will be stripped of all his offices, his removal giving increased power to Li Hung Chang.

"The officials generally welcome the Empress' return to power, but the people are indifferent. Kang Yuwel is charged with conspiring against the Empress

with conspiring against the Empress Dowager and has been declared an out-law and his arrest has been ordered."

Alarming News From Philippines.

London, Sept. 26.—The Globe says alarming information has been received by the Government as to the position of the British residents in the Philippines. The British gunboat Rattler of the China station has been ordered to proceed with all possible speed to the Island of Cebu, in the central part of the Philippines, where the British community is said to be in imminent danger from the natives.

TOLD MARCHAND TO GG.

Union Jack Hoisted at Fashoda While the Dervishes Crushed.

London, Sept. 26.-The Daily Telegraph's Cairo correspondent, telegraphing to day (Monday) says: General Kitchener found the French at Fashoda. He notified Major Marchand that he had express instructions that the territory was British, and the French must retire, and offered them presses to Care. Major ish, and the French must retire, and offered them passage to Cairo. Major Marchand absolutely declined to retire unless ordered to do so by his Government. No fighting occurred. Major Marchand was given clearly to understand that the British insisted upon their claims, and the rest has been left to be settled by diplomacy between the respective Governments.

General Kitchener sent a long official despatch to London, hoisted the Union

despatch to London, hoisted the Union Jack and the Egyptian ensign, and left as a garrison the 11th and 13th Soudanesse Battalions and the Cameron Highlanders to protect the British fiag. Col. Jackson commands the garrison.

Cairo, Sept. 26.—General Kitchener, commanding the Anglo-Egpytian expedition, has returned to Omdurman, having established posts at Fashoda and on the Sebat River. The troops did no fighting escept with a Dervish steamer on the way south, which was captured.

Last of the Dervishes Crushed.

Suakim, Sept. 26 — The only organized remnant of the Khalifa's army was defeated and its last stronghold, Gedaref, captured on Sept. 29, after three hours' hard fighting, when an Egyptian force numbering 1,300, under command of Col. Parsons, routed 3,000 Dervishes, of whom 500 were killed. Three British officers were wounded and 37 Egyptian soldiers killed and 50 wounded.

Four of the Great Powers Sign an Agree ment to That Effect.

ment to That Effect.

Rome, Sept. 26.—Within 24 hours Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy will append their signatures to an agreement for the pacifiation of the Island of Crete, including a plan for coercing the Sultan into submission. The scheme has for some time been drafted, but its enforcement was delayed to invite the participation of Germany, which country declined. At the beginning of the week the four powers will send an ultimatum to the Sultan of Turkey summoning him to accept the project, and informing him that unless he does so measures will be taken to enforce his compliance. The powers have irrevocably decided to settle the Cretan question immediately and will not hesitate to send their fleets to the Dardanelles, and beyond if necessary.

MR. CURZON ELEVATED.

The New Viceroy to India Is Baron Curzon of Kedleston.

London, Sept. 24.—It is officially announced that the Hon. George Curzon, until recently Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, who is to succeed the Earl of Elgin as Vicercy of India, has been elevated to the peerage as Baron Curzon of Kedleston.

The pet eagle of Troop B, First Illinois Cavalry, stationed at Fort Sheridan, has swooped down and robbed a lady guest of the gay plumaged bird which adorned her hat. There is trouble in the camp over the incident.

Miss Russell, dam of Maud S., the first mare to trot better than 2.10, died at the home of her owner, A. J. Alexander in Woodford County, Kentucky, last week, aged 33. She was probably one of the most famous brood mares in the world.

The Provincial Board of Health reports The Provincial Board of Health reports that during the month of August 230 people died. Out of this number 34 had died from fever, as against 12 last year. Diphtheria carried away 16, consumption 152, whooping cough 12, scarlatina 10, measles 6.


