STARTLING DISCLOSURE.

Another Serious Deficit Alleged To Be Discovered in Windsor's Finances.

Discovered in Windsor's Finances.

Auditor G. K. Prowse, who since last October has been busily engaged in getting the finances of Windsor in a proper shape, on Wednesday unearthed the startling disclosure that there is a deficit in the consolidated fund of \$11,828, besides the sinking fund deficit of \$37,219 56, which he found out three months ago. In order to understand the deficit that was unearthed by Mr. Prowse on Wednesday it must be explained that in 1881 the town consolidated its debt for \$270,000, for which debentures were issued. A portion of these consolidated its debt for \$270,000, for which debentures were issued. A portion of these debentures were exchanged for debentures becoming due after consolidation and the remainder were held for the purposes of sale to pay other old debentures that were not exchanged. Now there is yet to be paid \$66,500, and instead of the town clerk having debentures equal to that amount he only has \$54,672, showing a clear deficit of \$11,828. There were no books in the possession of the town where by it could be learned how many debentures were out, and in order to obtain this informacion Mr. Prowse dissected the amount paid by the town for coupons for

this information Mr. Prowse dissected the amount paid by the town for coupons for debentures before 1881, and this gave him the actual amount that is outstanding at the end of last year, which is \$66,500. What has become of this money cannot be traced until a further investigation has been made, but it has most likely been used, as the major part of the sinking fund was used to pay off the current expenses. In regard to the sinking fund deficit not a cent was placed to its credit until 1889, when Mayor Twomey made the first deposit, and one has been made each year since. The whole thing means that the present taxpayers are paying a certain since. Auditor Prowse has as far as he has gone made a thorough audit, and he is to be commended for bringing before the taxpayers a true statement of how the finances of the town are.
