the Western Ontario Bible Society, to the

The last printed report is a better basis of inquiry as to numbers. Here ten are Methodists and seventeen of other denominations, while the office of president, first and second vice-presidents, honorary secretary and treepresidents, honorary secretary and treas-urer are held by those not Methodist. If not

urer are held by those not Methodist. If not as many Presbyterians, Congregationalists and Laphists are on the board as are desired by these bodies, who is to blame? Not the Methodists. The appointment has been at the annual meeting, and none will say that attempts have been made to keep them off. The effort has been to get the most prominent and active supporters, and if any failure has existed it is not from causes that justify these unkind aspersions.

2. The use of influence to bring persons to the board meetings. It is said that there exists "more than a suspicion that on more than one occasion influence was brought to bear upon persons not remarkable for the

than one occasion influence was brought to bear upon persons not remarkable for the interest they take in the Bible Society work to be present and vote in a manner quite congenial so the Methodist section of the board." 
