The object of the visit was to search for an illicit still. The liquor found was evidently of illicit manufacture because it contained a large amount of fusil oil and also sugar. Woodward swore that he used the liquor for making cakes and syrups and also for bitters, but he never sold any of it. He claimed to have bought the liquor from Mr. McMillan, a licensed man of London South. Mr. Frank Love appeared for the defendant and Mr. McKillop looked after the interests of the Crown. The case was dismissed. The inland revenue people are quiet satisfied with the result of the trial, as their point was gained when the accused stated where he procured the liquor. He had refused this information when asked by the officers at the time of the seizure. The officers now have a clue to work on, as they are convinced that the liquor is of illicit manufacture.
