A TERRIFIC HURRICANE Sweeps the Fiji Islands—Churches Wreck-

ed and Plantations Devastated. VANCOUVER, B. C., March 14. - The steamship Miowara, which has arrived from Chinese and Japanese ports, brings particulars of a terrific hurricane which swept over the Fiji Islands on Jan. 6 and 7. The buildings on the Suva suffered very severely. The Presbyterian Church, the Wesleyan Church, and the Church of England were entirely destroyed. Other churches were unroofed and the custom house bonded store and many small stores and dwellings

were wrecked. The cocoanut and banana plantations were totally ruined. It will take five years for the plantations to recover from the effects of the storm. It was the most serious hurricane that has visited the Fijis for years. There will be a great scarcity of food among the natives owing to their food plantations having been destroyed. A few lives were lost.
