Lord Salisbury Kisses the Queen's Hand and Becomes Premier.

Lord Salisbury in a Tight Box Because of Joe Chamberlain.

Conference of Politicians Likely to Be in the New Ministry.

If Salisbury Accepts Office, Rosebery Is Not Bound to Help Him. SALISBURY IN A TIGHT PLACE.

London, June 25.—The Daily News says editorially: "If Lord Salisbury demands terms from Lord Rosebery, we trust the impudent request will be met with a peremptory refusal. If Lord Salisbury refuses to accept office he will play himself in the ludicrous and conspicuous position of one willing to wound yet afraid to strike. The fact is, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain has got Lord Salisbury in a mess, and the latter now calls upon Lord Rosebery to help him out of it. This is not Lord Rosebery's business. Lord Salisbury must either pluck up courage or exhibit a spectacle of impotence and poltroonery, of which

we are sure he will shrink.' The Westminster Gazette says Lord Rosebery has not received any communication from Lord Salisbury in regard to the conditions of acceptance of office by the latter, reports to the contrary notwithstanding.

GOSSIP ABOUT GLADSTONE. The Pall Mall Gazette says Mr. Gladstone, at his conference with Lord Rosebery last night, seriously questioned the wisdom of the resignation of the Ministry. Certain Liberals believe that Mr. Gladstone, having been physically fortified by his cruise in the North Sea, will throw the weight of his influence and eloquence upon the side of his old colleagues, but the ex-Premier's personal friends are strongly opposed to his taking any such course, fearing that the excitement and exertion might cause a physical reaction.

GETTING TOGETHER. The Liberal-Unionists held a con-ference at Lord Salisbury's house this morning at 11 o'clock. The Duke of Devonshire, Mr. Chamberlain, Mr. Balfour, Mr. Goschen and Sir Michael Hicks-Beach were present. Lord Salisbury went to Windsor

again this afternoon. The Unionist conference came to an end at 11:30 a.m., and Lord Salisbury almost immediately afterwards took a train for Windsor. It is not known definitely whether he has decided to accpt office.

GLADSTONE NOT IN IT. Herbert Gladstone this morning defi-nitely stated that his father would take no further part in political life.

THE RETORT COURTEOUS. The Pall Mall Gazette, referring to the Daily News' statement that if Lord Salisbury demand an agreement of support from the outgoing Government as a condition of his taking office, they will be refused, says: "If Lord Salisbury refuses to form a Ministry without terms, then Rosebery must again take up the responsibility, which none but a coward would ever have cast off on such a pretext as his. He ought to have dissolved Parliament instead of resigning."

LORD SALISBURY ACCEPTS. London, June 25 .- Lord Salisbury has accepted the commission to form a Ministry, and kissed the Queen's hand upon being formally appointed Premier. The Central News says that Lord Salisbury informed her Majesty that he was ready to form a Ministry, and submitted the names of the members of the proposed Cabinet. Mr. Balfour, it is said, has accepted the post of First Lord of the Treasury, and Mr. Chamberlain that of Secretary of State for the Colonies.

MEETING OF THE COMMONS. The House of Commons met at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and after the transaction of minor business adjourned until noon tomorrow.

SOO CANAL SCANDAL.

Botched Work Which Was Well Paid For by the Country.

Crib Work Filled With Ice and Frozen Earth That Rose and Floated Away.

(Special to the "Advertiser.") Ottawa, June 25.-The investigation into the Soo Canal contracts was continued in the public accounts committee this afternoon by Mr. Lister, the first witness being Mr. Thompson, the superintending engineer of the canal, recalled. From his evidence it appeared that the 7,000 feet of crib work was a failure. It had not been properly filled in, some of the filling being ice and frozen earth, which subsequently rose to the surface and floated away, and the crib work, not being able to withstand the pressure on it, bulged out. The price paid for it was \$450 a yard. Nobody was discharged for the botchwork. Ryan & Co., the contractors. received \$90,000 bonus in order to have the canal ready for opening on July 1, 1894. He did not know if the canal was yet open, nor did he know that the tug Jessie had grounded there the other day in eight feet of water in the entrance. He advised the pier in the middle upon which the C. P. R. bridge rested. He did not think it was what Mr. Lister described it, "an engineering atrocity." There was a span of 150 feet across. There were other bridges with a single span across larger spaces.

There was no pier on the American side. He did not know why the Government built this bridge for the C. P. R. It cost about \$56,000, and was paid for by the Canadian Government. Witness was examined further by Mr. Gibson. who got out the fact that the blunder of the crib work required \$66,000 to repair, in addition to a further sum for

Mr. Hugh Ryan, head of the firm of contractors who built the lock, was examined by Mr. Haggart. The first charge was that he received \$16 for masonry instead of the \$11 for the 5.500 yards necessary for the enlargement of the canal. This was allowed. because the price of labor and mechanics had gone up considerably. While stone-masons were \$2.50, they had to pay them \$4 per day up there. Everything else was in proportion. Mr. Ryan swore that the bonus of \$90,000 he received for hastening the completion of the canal did not compensate him, because he paid \$64,000 for extra plant and calculated \$16,000 for night work. The Prohibition in Force Until the Commissioners Give Notice.

The Colville Springs Ready - A Scheme to Save Street Watering.

The water in the Colville springs has now been collected in the pond and will be pumped into the city reservoir this afternoon. The springs have a good flow-in fact, the grounds seem to be

full of them, and they can be seen bub-tling up all over. A great many people used their lawn services last night. Perhaps they were unaware that the prohibition of street and lawn watering is still in force. Neither will be permitted until the reservoir supply warrants it, and when it does the water commissioners will

give the consumers notice.

Waterworks Engineer Moore has a plan which will save a waste of vast quantities of water now used for street watering. It has always seemed regrettable that the beautiful Springbank water should be thrown on the roads, when river water would serve the purpose equally as well. "As the Grand Trunk are now drawing their supply from the river," said Mr. Moore, "I pro-pose to take advantage of their pumping machinery and to erect three large tanks along the track—one at Richmond, one at Wellington and one at Ridout street-from which the street watering carts can be filled. One contractor told me that he filled 130 carts a day. As each cart holds 600 gallons, that means 78,000 gallons.
