PREMIER GREENWAY.

His Views on the Future of Manitoba—Continuation on the School Question.

Montreal, Que., April 21.—Hon. Thomas Greenway, Premier of Manitoba, returns to Manitoba tomorrow. He was seen at the Windsor by a correspondent. The object of his visit to Montreal, he said, was to look after immigration and other matters in which his Province was interested. He hoped for larger immigration to Manitoba this year than last. They intended to try the system of having immigrants conducted personally by the Government agents from Great Britain. Farm hands in Manitoba, he said, were in great demand. He thought Quebec farmers would find it more to their advantage to go to Manitoba than into the States. He did not consider that the difficulty with the schools would have any effect on immigration. His Government was disposed to remedy, if possible, any grievance under which the minority might suffer.

Thomas Houston, 33 years of age, town clerk of Whitty, Ont., died at his home Sunday while the family were at the church.

discussed the bill for hours, and no portion of the bill was adopted.

A number of other bills, held back until the last moment, were advanced a stage.

The House then took up a Nova Scotia bill to incorporate a coal and transportation company. The House had a hearty laugh at the expense of Mr. Oulmet. He made a somewhat lengthy defence of the Chignecto Marine Railway, and not until he sat down did he know that the House was considering another bill altogether.

Mr. Edgar, with mock gravity, accused Mr. Oulmet with obstructing business with irrelevant matters. The House took up questions by members, and a number of interrogations were replied to by the Government. The more important, however, were not answered for the reason that the Ministers concerned were not in their places. They are too busy laying election pipes to attend to the business for which they are paid. This kind of obstruction, so fatal to doing business promptly, has characterized this extra session throughout.

The House went into committee upon the bill to provide the machinery for the assessment by commissioners of the claims of British Columbia sealers illegally seized by the United States in the Behring Sea, and which the United States is bound to pay under the Paris arbitration award. The measure was passed and read a third time.

The bill of Mr. Foster empowering the Government to complete the section of horses before being exported from the country was adopted. This bill was No. 27 on the paper.

Mr. Foster proposed that the House should return to order No. 20, but Sir Richard Cartwright drew the Minister's attention to the fact that he could not go back without consent. Order twenty was the resolution authorizing a loan of \$200,000 for the purpose of defense. There was strong opposition to going on with so important a matter at a very late hour, and the subject was laid over.

A resolution was passed through committee authorizing the Government to make a further loan of \$1,615,000 at 3-1-2 per cent to the harbor commissioners of Montreal.

Upon motion to go into committee of supply, Mr. Campbell (Kent) resumed the debate upon the Soulanges Canal job, which but for the Auditor-General's intervention, would have resulted in the payment to Contractor Goodwin of \$200,000, to which he was not entitled. Mr. Campbell very severely censured the action of Sir Hibbert Tupper in going into the Justice Department after he had ceased to be a Minister and telling the Deputy Minister to write to the Railway Department allowing the contractor's claim, which had been adversely reported upon by John D. Baird, the chief engineer of the Railway Department. He said that Sir Hibbert Tupper, who was at the time a private member of Parliament, had no business to do any such thing. It was an audacious and unjustifiable transaction.

The Hon. Mr. Campbell said, merited dismissal from the services for having written such a letter without the authority of the responsible Minister at the time. He said that Sir Hibbert Tupper had done as a private member what he would not dare to have done while he was a Minister.

Sir Richard Cartwright, who had been at the time a private member, explained that he had arrived at the conclusion that he was a Minister and that he had merely reminded the deputy minister after he had ceased to be a Minister.

Mr. Campbell was not prepared to acquit Sir Hibbert Tupper of blame. He said that the Hon. Mr. Cartwright, the Minister of Railways and Canals, in ordering the immediate payment of the money.

Mr. Campbell said that Sir Hibbert Tupper as a young and inexperienced barrister who had never won his spurs at the bar had taken upon himself a serious responsibility in rejecting the opinions of such an eminent lawyer as Sir John Thompson and of such well known engineers as Mr. Munro and Mr. Sedgwick.

Mr. Lister moved the adjournment of the debate.

The House adjourned at midnight.

The Conservative party in this city, as elsewhere in many places, is hopelessly split in twain. There are two Conservative associations here and two sets of candidates. But the high tax usurping leader means to try the tactics of bribe-promising on a most extravagant scale as means of winning him in the ensuing election. He intends commencing at Prince Edward Island and taking in all the territory west of the Pacific coast for the most extravagant terms for a new lease of power. In Prince Edward Island he promises seven new railways for the five constituting what he has there. This is more than one railway for each member. From this he makes a jump to the extreme end of the Dominion, and intends to take in the whole of the continent of a resolution which reads as follows: "That it is expedient to authorize the Governor-in-Council to make a loan to the Province of British Columbia of an amount in money equal to \$20,000 per mile for a railway from Lethbridge or McLeod to Nelson, in the Province of British Columbia, which loan shall be paid on or before 1915, with interest at the rate of 3-1-2 per cent, per annum, payable half-yearly until the payment of the principal." This disburse from Lethbridge to Nelson, through the Crow's Nest Pass, is about 200 miles, so that the loan will amount to about \$4,000,000.

Messrs. Foster and Laurier had a conference yesterday regarding the state of public business. Mr. Foster stated that the supplementary estimates and some bills were yet to come down. Mr. Laurier said when all the business before the House Mr. Foster and he could have a conference to decide which could go through. This is a very fair proposition. But what Government, with an iota of sense or of honesty in intentions, could keep back estimates and bills till a few hours before the death of Parliament and the collapse of an extra session, and then call for a specific purpose?

Mr. C. Devlin, Liberal M. P. for Ottawa county, who was seriously ill, was in his seat again today and was congratulated by his friends on his rapid recovery.

Dr. Montague also resumed his seat.
