WIRED TOGETHER

Bride and Groom 200 Miles Apart Married by Telegraph.

A marriage service by telegraph with the bride and groom apart, was carried out between Kansas City and Mulhall, O. T., on Thursday. The groom was Andrew M. Candell, of Washington, D. C., an entomologist attached to the department of agriculture of the United States government, and the bride was Miss Penelope Cundiff, daughter of a prosperous farmer, of Perkins, O. T. Candell and Miss Cundiff became engaged about six months ago, and the wedding was set for May. Last week, however, Mr. Candell was called to Harrisonville, Mo., by the death of his mother. His duties made it necessary for him to start back to Washington at once. He asked Miss Cundiff to come to Kansas City so that the wedding could take place at the home of his sister, Miss Cundiff, who was unable to reach Kansas City in time and arrangements were made with the telegraph company to have the marriage ceremony conducted by wire. A direct line between Kansas City and Mulhall was placed at the disposal of the couple. Mr. Candell secured Rev. Albert H. Linder, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and accompanied by two friends, went to the telegraph office. At Mulhall Miss Cundiff was accompanied to the telegraph office by her parents and sister. The questions and responses were wired back and forth and repeated at each end to the couple by the telegraph operators, the ceremony requiring 25 minutes' time.

Y. M. C. A. Directors' Annual Report.

The annual report and financial statement of the board of directors of the Y. M. C. A. for 1899 has been presented, and is very gratifying in every respect. The report shows that in 1899 the amount subscribed to free the association from debt was \$32,526.05, the payment of subscriptions extending over three years. The indebtedness of the association at that time was \$30,000.27, thus leaving \$2,525.78 subscribed to cover interest. The balance due on subscriptions at this date is \$12,425.38. Of this \$8,208.35 is owed by some 37 persons, in balances of \$50 and over. The total receipts for the year were \$4,183.91, and the disbursements \$4,187.91.

The report says in part: "The entertainment committee rendered good service and gave a splendid course at small expense, which was much appreciated, as evidenced by the fact that the aggregate attendance was 4,511. The membership committee are successful in bringing into the association many young men. The social committee have arranged for special evenings and conferences from time to time. The religious work committee have worked hard, and maintained the parts of the year, at least men's meetings, Sundays, at 4:15 p.m., Bible classes and other services, with an aggregate attendance of some 2,000 weekly, and during the college weeks the medical students hold a weekly meeting in the building. To the 790 subscribers who helped us so nobly with the liquidation of the debt we return thanks to the presiding elders, ladies and others who have in any way contributed to the success of the work. We express our deep appreciation of their efforts."

In closing the report refers to the good work being done by the association representatives with the Canadian contingents in South Africa. Messrs. Harris, Best and McKellar, and expressed the hope that more of the members and friends may see their way clear to support these brethren financially.

Some \$120 was secured from friends for the department, and the directors trust that it will be increased to at least \$200. They also ask the hearty co-operation and support of the citizens for the current year.
