#### An Affront on Canada.

The report of the special counsel of the United States Department of Justice, on the Gaynor-Greene case, is insulting to Canadian justice. In the interests of international good feeling it should not have been given out for publication. This is the least the American department might have done. Gaynor and Greene are under arrest, charged with embezzling \$2,000-Quebec City in pursuit and kidnapped them with the most reckless and insolent contempt of the Quebec courts, their buccaneering captors, but were returned to Quebec where extraditorney-General of the United States being represented by Mr. Marion Erwin. Mr. Erwin complains to his department that obstacles are being thrown in his way, and insinuates that undue influence is being exerted by the prisoners' lawyers, because they are connected in a professional way with the heads of the administration of justice in the Dominion, and in the Province of Quebec. This communication, insulting to Canadian statesmen and Canadian courts, has been made public and will be the basis of an appeal to the British embassy at Washington by the American department of justice. Of course the British Government will not aggravate the insult by interference in the case, but will let Canadian justice take its course. The United States must fight it out in Canadian courts. ### Destroying Nationalities.

The Russianizing of Finland proceeds remorselessly, and scarcely less drastic is the Prussian policy of repression in Schleswig and Polish Prussia The benignant policy of Great Britain in South Africa shines by contrast.

In Finland, Russia is engaged in a wanton attempt to crush the spirit of a nationality. There was no question of Finnish loyalty. Under the mild constitution granted the province by Czar Alexander I. in 1809, and untouched by every Czar but the present one, Finland has been tranquil and contented, and has fulfilled every obligation to the suzerain power. But the Finns have maintained their own religion, their language, their customs, and their unity as a race. #### Old Age Pensions.

Old-age pension schemes are now in working order in New Zealand, Victoria and New South Wales. New Zealand is the leader, beginning four years ago; Victoria followed a year ago, and New South Wales six months later. In New Zealand the maximum pension is \$90 a year; in the Australian states, \$130 a year, or 10 shillings a week. Expected Bride Has an Income of \$60,000 a Year-Groom Got Away.

Washington, July 12 .- A story of a half completed marriage ceremony came to light today in which the principals are Frank Mitchell, a clerk in the car department of the Southern Visitor (to Nebraska farmer)-It has Railway offices in this city, and Theodora H.
