DISGUSTING EXHIBITION

At a Sunday Bull Fight at Juarez, Mexico.

Spectators Cheer Vociferously as a Wounded Bull Impaled the Premier Matador and Tossed Him Into the Air.

El Paso, Tex., April 1.—The usual Sunday bull fight at Juarez, Mex., was accompanied by a somewhat unusual feature, the goaded animal turning the tables on the matador. Several bulls had been brought into the arena, but the amusement they furnished was rather tame from a Mexican standpoint. There were many Americans among the spectators, who were somewhat disgusted with the brutal show, as horse after horse was gored by the tormented bulls, while the picadors and matadors escaped scot-free.

This was all changed, however, when Jarlito, the premier matador, was preparing to thrust his long, double-edged sword into the heart of the fifth bull which had faced him. It stood in the center of the arena, bleeding from many wounds. Suddenly the bull made a quick lunge forward. So unexpected was the attack that the fighter was unable to make the customary sidestep. He was caught on the bull's horns in the middle of the body and tossed about like a toy balloon.

Before he could be rescued, Jarlito's clothing was literally stripped from his body and his right leg and hip were severely lacerated. It will probably

PREMIER ROBLIN MAY AMEND LIQUOR LAW.

Promises to Correct Defects in the Measure Should It Pass—A Prohibition Convention.

Winnipeg, March 31.—The following letter to a prominent temperance worker is published today:

"My Dear Sir,—In reply to your inquiry, I would say that if the liquor act is brought into force by the vote of April 2, and if the working out thereof is found to be defective or inoperative, it will be amended within the limits of the provincial constitution to replace such defects, and make so operative as to accomplish the result desired. Yours faithfully (Signed), R. P. ROBLIN, Premier of Manitoba."

A great deal of betting is being indulged in on the result of the referendum, voting on which takes place on Wednesday. All bets seem to be on the various phases of the bill's defeat, none taking the ground that it will carry.

A PROHIBITION CONVENTION.
Petrolia, Ont., March 31.—A prohibition convention was held in the council chamber here today, and was attended by representatives from all parts of the country. After considerable discussion, a resolution was passed condemning the conditions imposed by the so-called referendum as unfair and unreasonable, and that the temperance people, but advising nevertheless that a determined effort be made to carry prohibition at the polls on Dec. 4.

Committees were appointed in the several municipalities throughout the country, and a general organization was effected, with J. G. McCrae, Sarnia, as chairman of the executive committee.

No prohibition candidates for parliament were named.

THE TRIAL OF MABEL HAINES

Evidence in Rebuttal—Cicse of Prosecution.

Indian Half-Breed Confesses Murder—Three Men on Trial for Shooting a Farmer.

Mount Holly, N. J., April 1.—Testimony in rebuttal was presented today at the trial of Mrs. Mabel Fenton Haines, charged with the murder of her two-year-old stepdaughter, Gwen-doline. The prosecution closed its case at 10 a.m. and argument was then begun.

CONFESSED TO MURDER.
Binghamton, N. Y., March 31.—Wm. Carter, the half-breed Indian, who is under arrest for the murder of Chas. Carman, at Port Crane, five days ago, made a confession under oath today, in which he admits the crime and alleges that he shot Carman at the instigation of Dr. C. J. Tiffany, who paid him to kill Carman. In the affidavit, which was drawn up by District Attorney Clark, Carter says in part: "About three or four months ago, shortly before Christmas, Dr. Tiffany came to our house and said: 'I want to put Charles Carman out of the way.' He then asked me if I had a revolver. I told him I had not, and he said he would give me the money to buy one. He said that as soon as I had killed him to come to his office and he would pay me \$100 then. Wednesday night I went to Dr. Tiffany's barn and stayed there until 8:35, when I went to the back of Carman's barn, where I remained until Mr. Carman came out with his lantern. I waited until Mr. Carman came out, when I fired one shot at him." Carter produced the revolver he said he shot Carman with, and also the cartridges, when arrested today. Dr. Tiffany, who was arrested as an accessory before the fact, denies Carter's allegations in every point, and declares that he had no foreknowledge of the shooting of Carman.

FARMER KILLED BY MASKED MEN.

Hudson, N. Y., April 1.—Willis Burton and Fred Van Wormer and Harvey Bruce were brought into court here yesterday to answer the charge of murdering Peter A. Hallenbeck on Dec. 24, 1901. On Christmas Eve at about 7:30 o'clock, Peter A. Hallenbeck, one of the most highly respected and well-to-do farmers in the town of Greenport, N. Y., was called to his back door, and upon opening it was met by four masked men. Thirteen bullets were fired into his body.

In the house with him at the time were his wife and his mother, who is 82 years old. The other occupants of the house had gone to Christmas Eve services at a church about a mile distant.

A neighbor, hearing the shots and seeing men drive away from the Hallenbeck house, made an investigation, and gave the alarm. Sheriff Best and the Hudson police were immediately notified and an alarm sent throughout Columbia county, but the murderers escaped. A systematic and thorough investigation was started at once and every possible clue that might be of future value was noted.

POSSIBLE MOTIVE.
Hallenbeck, it was learned, had lent money to a family named Van Wormer. The Van Wormers occupied a small tract of land near Hallenbeck's farm, and Hallenbeck had a mortgage on the Van Wormer's land. The Van Wormer family consisted of Mrs. Hallenbeck and her three sons, Willis, Burton and Fred. Hallenbeck foreclosed the mortgage and the Van Wormers moved to Kinderhook, eighteen miles north, last September. Suspicion pointed to the Van Wormer brothers, and on Christmas Day Sheriff Best, as a posse, went to Kinderhook, surrounded the Van Wormer house, and arrested the three Van Wormer boys, and their cousin, Harvey Bruce, whom was visiting them. The house was searched, and three revolvers found. A fourth was found the next day. The boys, who are aged between 18 and 22 years, were taken to the Hudson jail and locked up.

A CLUE.
The sheriff stripped them of their wearing apparel and without delay, on Christmas night drove to the scene of the crime and fitted the shoes to the prints in the snow. It is claimed that the shoes matched the footprints exactly. One pair of the shoes had a heel plate. When the doctors made the autopsy on the body of the murdered man, it was found that the bullets taken from Hallenbeck's body were of the same calibre as the pistols found at the Van Wormer homestead. It was learned also that the Van Wormer boys and Harvey Bruce hired a horse and wagon from Liveryman George Brown, of Kinderhook, on Christmas eve at 5 o'clock.

A PHILADELPHIA FIRE.
Philadelphia, April 1.—The six-story building at 601 and 612 Market street, occupied by the George De B. Keim Saddlery Company, and the Joel Baily, Davis Company, wholesale notions, was completely destroyed by fire yesterday. There were 60 persons, mostly girls, in the building, when the fire was discovered, but they were all gotten out safely. The loss on the building and contents is estimated at \$110,000. The Joel Baily, Davis Company occupies the building to the east of the burned structure, and lost several thousand dollars. Alexander B. Cohn & Co., manufacturers of ladies' cloaks, to the west of the burned buildings, sustained slight damage.

NO MORE GAS FROM CANADA.
Detroit, Mich., April 1.—F. J. Byrne, owner of the pipe line under the Detroit River, and doing business as the Interior Construction Company, has thrown up both hands and acknowledges that the Canadian gas fields are exhausted. Over a year ago Mr. Byrne commenced driving wells in Canada to reach the Trenton rock. He was driving the wells when Detroit's natural gas supply was cut off, and kept on boring until a week ago, when after reaching a depth of 2,500 feet, he abandoned the undertaking as hopeless. The Canadian gas fields in Canada are still boring, but Mr. Byrne says Detroit has undoubtedly seen the last of the natural gas.

THE MATCH FACTORY W/L. BLOWN DOWN

Walkerville Concern Again Has Misfortune—Partially Wrecked by Sunday's Gale.

Walkerville, April 1.—The long east wall of the Walkerville Match Company's factory at Walkerville was blown out during the gale Sunday night. It was two stories high and about eighty feet long.

The explosion, in which two men were killed, and the severe fire that the company had to stand, are other links in the chain of misfortunes that have fallen the lot of this concern.

The Death Record.

London, March 31.—Lieut.-General Sir Andrew Clarke, agent-general for Victoria, Australia, is dead. He was born in 1824.

Newark, N. J., April 1.—Dr. Thomas Dunn English, author of "Ben Bolt," died at his home in this city today. He was born in Philadelphia in 1819, and graduated from the University of Pennsylvania as a doctor of medicine in 1839. Later he studied law and was admitted to the Philadelphia bar. He engaged in Journalism in New York from 1844 to 1859, when he came to Newark to practice medicine. He was a member of the New Jersey Legislature in 1863-64. He served in the U. S. Congress from a New Jersey district.

Quebec, March 31.—J. N. Proulx, registrar of the department of lands, forests and fisheries, was found dead in his bed this morning.

Toronto, Ont., March 31.—Rev. J. A. Dowler, a superannuated Methodist minister, died this morning at his residence, 14 Bernard avenue, aged 76 years. Mr. Dowler's service in the church extended over 35 years, during which time he was stationed at different points in the eastern part of the province. He was born in Ireland and came to this country when a young man, and shortly afterwards entered

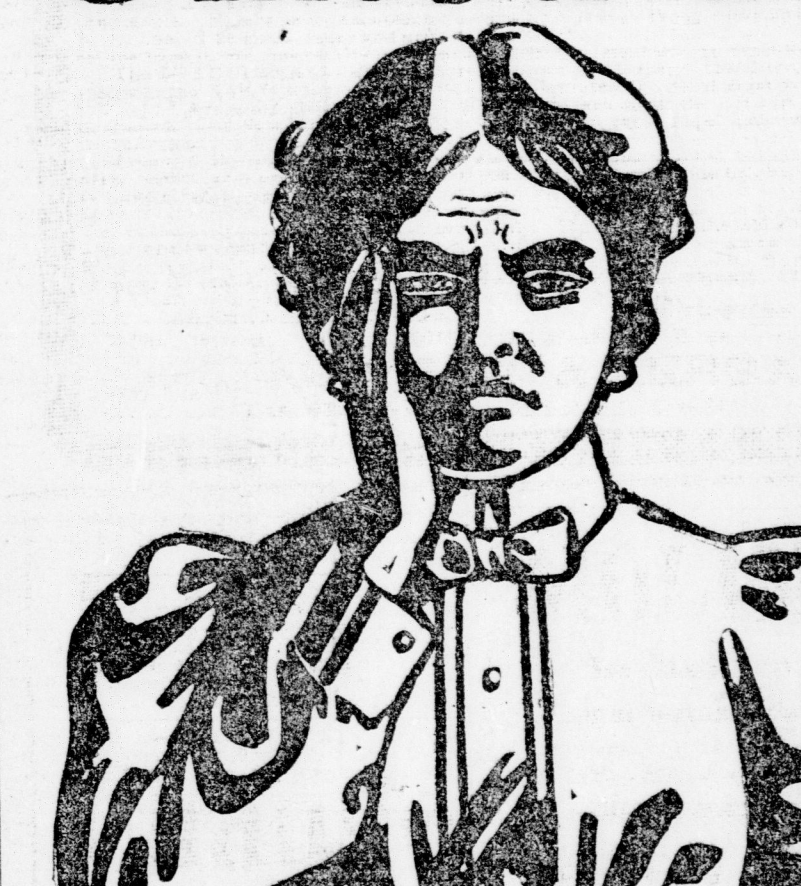
