J. L. GALBRAITH IN THE SOUTH

Former Londoner Is Highly Pleased in Virginia.

The following extract is taken from the Bristol Herald Courier of Sept. 17, 1910:

Recital at Virginia Institute. The piano and song recital given by S. T. Schroetter, pianist, and J. Lamont Galbraith, tenor, at Virginia Institute Thursday evening had been eagerly anticipated by many lovers of classic music and the occasion was in no way a disappointment. The admirers of Mr. Schroetter were anxious to hear him again after his absence from the city, and every number of his varied and delightful programme gave intense pleasure and revealed anew his wonderful skill as a performer. The Nocturne by Chopin and Second Rhapsody by Liszt were exceptionally pleasing selections, but applause after each was most insistent and was responded to with some exquisite numbers.

Keen interest was felt when Mr. Galbraith, the new director of voice culture, faced the expectant throng, it being his first appearance before a Bristol audience. He has a delightfully flexible and sympathetic voice, and the liquidity of his notes was unsurpassed, but he is most truly great in his climaxes where his voluminous tones rise to the rank of tragic music. His execution of each number was very fine, but a programme of such music as the noted Bosphorus singer would suit his voice admirably and would possibly give a better disclosure of his powers.

As mentioned in the extract, Mr. Galbraith has been appointed to the very lucrative position of vocal director of the Virginia Institute, Bristol, Virginia, the conservatory of which numbers above two hundred; also director of the choir of the First Baptist Church in that city.

REGULAR W. C. T. U. MEETING ON TUESDAY

All Those Who Assisted in Fair Dining Hall Were Thanked.

The regular session of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union was held in the lecture hall of the public library on Tuesday, the president, Mrs. Hubert Ashplant, in charge.

The minutes were read and approved. A request from Mrs. R. J. Webster, 230 Oxford street, was read, to the effect that any who desired to subscribe to the lumbermen's work shall send such largesse to her at her address, or to Mrs. Ashplant at 466 King street. She hoped that none would permit her inability to make a personal appeal for this very important part of their Christian service to interfere with their giving, and the time for sending it draws near.

The president then reminded the county superintendents to take the necessary steps to secure and send to the provincial superintendents their reports. These should be in the latter's hands by Oct. 3. She hoped this work would be so thoroughly well done as may secure for Middlesex County the good record she is sure each union has well deserved.

The Scripture lesson was given by Mrs. Newton. That followed by a solo, "Will Not Be Long," rendered by Mrs. Morgan, soloist in the Centennial Methodist Church, who was accompanied by Mrs. Armstrong.

The resolution of committees passed at the Middlesex County convention were read and approved. Fair work and its incidents were then discussed, and all who assisted in the dining hall were heartily thanked, as were also all the patrons.

BANDEAU IS IN STYLE FOR HAIR ONCE MORE

Jewelled or Sequined Ribbon or One of Gold To Be Much in Favor.

London, Sept. 27.—True to historical precedent the present season brings up the problem of what particular kind of ornament shall be made the vogue, and the approaching season is to be no exception.

"London's fashionable world feels that it has decided that question already," said Mons. Jules Scollors, the court hairdresser, who speaks with authority about such things. "There never has been a time when the ornaments for the hair have been so popular. At the same time a note of simplicity will be struck this season. What can look more charming, for instance, than a string of pearls wound loosely through the hair and falling just above the left ear? Such an arrangement lends a charming effect.

"On the other hand, there is nothing in reality so effective as the ribbon bandeau. This season it is introduced in all sorts of ways—jewelled ribbon, sequined ribbon and ribbon of gold and silver tissue with pearl embroidery. They all serve the same purpose, and give a most finished appearance to a well dressed head of hair. The reign of the artificial flower as a hair ornament is absolutely over. The ribbon of 'paste' banders has entirely taken its place. High bandeaux of colored paste, fashioned after the old Greek key pattern, will be the popular wear for the theatre or dinner party, while the aigrette, which long has been out of fashion for the evening, is returning to favor.

"For certain styles of hairdressing nothing looks more effective than a sweeping aigrette of black or white, fixed into the hair with a jewelled clasp. In fact, some of the most beautiful aigrettes have a stem of jewelled peacock's feather design standing up in the aigrette itself. Personally, though, I think the most beautiful ornament for the hair is the Grecian double fillet, either of paste or jewelled ribbon, worn at the back of a Grecian coiffure, and drawn lightly through the wavelets in front."

COOK BY HOT AIR

Superheated to 1,000 Degrees May Supplant Fire in Kitchen.

London, Sept. 27.—It would seem that "hot air" finally is to serve a more useful purpose than the convenience of the political orator. According to the big guns of chefdom, who gathered themselves at the Bakers' Exhibition in Agricultural Hall, it will be utilized to cook the succulent steaks of the future.

Grillrooms will lose some of their picturesque quality when the white-capped cooks turning the lamb chops have departed, but the health faddists, it is pointed out, can be reconciled by the knowledge that their food is being prepared under still more cleanly conditions than those attendant upon the fire that roasts.

This utilization of superheated air for cooking purposes is held to be simplicity itself. The steam from an ordinary kitchen boiler is conveyed in pipes to the "superheater" where it is a series of coils above a coke fire its temperature is raised to 1,000 degrees, Fahrenheit. At the same time the heat is not increased, thus obviating any danger of burning pipes.

Passed through the hollow rods of a grill the air quickly raises the iron to the same temperature as itself, and then anything can be cooked from a loaf of bread to beefsteak.

The inventor predicts that the kitchen of the future will have no blazing fire, and that everything will be cooked by the turn of a valve admitting the superheated air to the special tube over the grill. He points out that there are no fumes and that no heat is wasted, because the air afterwards can be turned into the radiators and used for heating rooms.

U. S. WATER TERMINALS

Railways Prevent Development of Waterways Traffic, Says Government Investigator.

Washington, Sept. 27.—"Probably the greatest single deterrent to water terminal advance in the United States is the present adverse attitude of the rail lines toward independent water traffic, in their exclusive control of frontage, in refusal or neglect to coordinate general water traffic, and in refusal to promote generally with the water lines in through movement of traffic."

This is one of the conclusions of Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations, in part 3. Just made public, of his report to the President on water transportation in the United States. After an exhaustive inquiry into the harbor situation of the country, and analysis of conditions, Commissioner Smith deals in this section of the report with water terminals and he finds five facts regarding them: That terminals are as important underlying relation of rail to water transport as channels; that the harbors of the country have not fully developed their terminal frontage, nor are they properly organized or controlled; that railways largely control water terminals, often to the disadvantage of general water traffic; that there is almost no linking up of the rail and general water systems at the water's edge, but rather the opposite tendency, and that there is little co-operation by localities with the Federal Government, which improves their channels.

Relating to railroad co-operation, Commissioner Smith says: "Until this underlying relation of rail to water transport is adjusted on some common sense basis of harmony, there is little hope of great advance in water terminal relations."

Lack of co-operation between localities and the Federal Government in water terminal development, he says, is in contrast with continental countries whose waterways have been most highly developed.

ANGLO-GERMAN DUKE

King George Said Not To Be Partial to His Expatriated Relative.

London, Sept. 27.—The Duke and Duchess of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha are touring England in an automobile, and it is rumored that their reception by King George at Balmoral was not marked by any great show of enthusiasm, because the duke chose to become a German for the sake of a title. The duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha was originally held by the brother of Queen Victoria's Prince Consort. When he died, the next heir was the late King Edward, but as the acceptance of the title meant the adoption of Germany as fatherland, his inheritance was out of the question.

The Duke of Edinburgh, his brother, however, accepted the Saxe-Coburg title. When he died his heir was the Duke of Connaught, but that typically English prince refused to give his fealty anywhere but to his motherland, so the throne was naturally offered to his son, Prince Arthur of Connaught.

He, too, refused it, and the title ultimately found its way to his cousin, the son of the Duchess of Albany, who was placed under the direct care of the Kaiser, and so became a German prince.

MASONIC CASE QUASHED.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—The famous Emancipation Lodge exposure case came to notice again today in the court of king's bench. This lodge of French Free Masons is the one that a month ago was said to be conspiring to damage the Eucharistic Congress. The exposure, which led to a civic investigation, was based on papers alleged to have been stolen by A. J. Lemieux from Larose, secretary of the Emancipation Lodge. Lemieux was indicted by the grand jury, and his case came up in the king's bench today, when Judge St. Pierre made the startling discovery that not a single paper in connection with the case had been signed by court officials.

There being no case to go on with the judge could do nothing but quash the indictment.
