## LONDON FIRM WON

Secures Payment for Consignment of  
 Goods at Chatham.

## NO OSTENTATION FOR WOODROW WILSON

Jeffersonian Simplicity to Mark the  
 Coming Inauguration.

[Canadian Press.]  
 Washington, Dec. 26. — Jeffersonian  
 simplicity is to mark the coming in-  
 auguration of President-elect Wilson.  
 There will probably be the greatest out-  
 pouring of people that has ever marked  
 the inauguration of any president, but  
 according to Chairman William Easton,  
 of the committee, there will be no  
 ostentation. He contends that democracy  
 demands that there be no display, and  
 he is upheld by Thomas Nelson Page,  
 who is quoted as saying:  
 "President Jefferson's act of riding up  
 Pennsylvania avenue on horseback has  
 been derided, but the people who have  
 studied history have realized that he  
 did it in a dignified manner and that  
 his inauguration had at least as much  
 real dignity and true simplicity as that  
 of any president."

The subscriptions to the \$150,000 fund  
 for the inaugural affair is growing fast,  
 and undoubtedly will be over-subscribed.

## THE BISHOP'S PASTORAL

Letter Sent to Clergy and Laity of the  
 Diocese of Huron.

The following pastoral letter was  
 issued by His Lordship Bishop Wil-  
 liams to the clergy and laity of the  
 Diocese of Huron:

London, Canada, Dec. 7, 1912.  
 To All in Christ Jesus in the Diocese  
 of Huron:  
 Dear Brethren,—Once again it is my  
 privilege to wish you all a happy  
 Christmas, and to express the hope  
 that each Christmas Day finds us more  
 like Christ in spirit and life—nearer to  
 God.

God became man. That is the great  
 fact—the great message of Christmas  
 Day. Two of the greatest perplexities  
 that bewildered and oppressed man-  
 kind were: Can man know God? Can  
 man have fellowship with God? Jesus  
 Christ, born as on Christmas Day, is  
 God's answer to these questions. To  
 know Jesus is to know God; to have  
 fellowship with Jesus is to have fel-  
 lowship with God. Thus the clouds  
 and darkness that surrounded the  
 eternal were swept away; the humble  
 and the lowly may know and have fel-  
 lowship with the high and the holy One  
 that inhabiteth eternity. Thus also the  
 message of Christmas is essentially a  
 message of universal joy; for it opens  
 to all people, new hopes, new visions  
 for the individuals and for the race;  
 new possibilities of goodness and  
 greatness and glory. It does this for  
 all—even for the sinners, the outcast,  
 and the lost; for "this is a faithful  
 saying and worthy of all men to be  
 received, that Christ Jesus came into  
 the world to save sinners," to uplift  
 them and make them new.

Let us, then, all this Christmas season,  
 seek afresh to know Christ more  
 truly and to enter into fellowship with  
 him more practically; seek to know his  
 mind, to walk in his ways, and to do  
 his works. Let us seek to make others  
 glad with the gladness wherewith we  
 have been made glad in him. So, and  
 so only, shall we enter into the mean-  
 ing of Christmas Day.

"Behold, I bring you good tidings  
 of great joy, which shall be to all  
 people, for unto you is born this day,  
 in the city of David, a Saviour, who is  
 Christ the Lord."—Luke, 4, 11.

Praying that we may all have a truly  
 merry Christmas, believe me, yours
