

When Conduits Are Ready the City Will Follow Hamilton's

The city of Hamilton is the first municipality in Ontario to take steps under the new Beck act compelling all telephone and telegraph companies to place their wires underground. There will be no such attempt made in London for some

When the new lines are laid north on Richmond street and east on Dundas street, overtures will be made to the companies, and if they refuse to come to an amicable arrangement, a move will be made to compel them to do so.

LONDON'S SHARE WILL BE \$100,000

This Is the Estimate Now of the City's Liability in Guarantee of Bonds.

FOR PORT BURWELL LINE

ondon Will Be Amply Protected President Reason, of the Board of Trade, Told The Advertiser.

It is estimated that the city of London's share of the bond issue for the proposed traction line from London to Port Burwell will be \$100,000, or onethird the amount of the guarantee of \$300,000, decided upon at the meeting here on Thursday. The remainder of the money needed to construct the road, variously estimated to cost from \$500, 000 to \$900,000, will be raised by the sale of stock to private persons. It will be on a strictly business basis, and the delegates present on Thursday were The switch on Oxford street will be moved and placed elsewhere. Men are now getting it ready. Another switch will be installed without any trouble whatever.

"The amount has not been definitely decided upon," said Dr. Harr T. Reason, president of the board of trade. You may rest assured that the city of London will be protected. The bond issue to be guaranteed is but \$10,000 a mile, and the road, under any circumstances, would bring twice that amount under the hammer. If the city did guararmee \$100,000, it could readily be seen that the corporation was amply pro-
