HIGH HONORS FOR INGERSOLL OLD BOY

Dr. Bloor Appointed Senior Professor in Chemistry at Harvard.

INGERSOLL, July 2.—Few Ingersoll young men have achieved greater distinction than Dr. Walter R. Bloor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Bloor. Dr. Bloor, after graduating from Queen's University, Kingston, finished his post graduate course at Harvard University, Boston.

He has been appointed a senior professor of biological chemistry at Harvard, and will shortly take up his work at this famous university. Dr. Bloor has been residing in the States for a few years, and has a wide reputation, and it is significant that at the time he received the opportunity from Harvard he received similar offers from three other universities. Dr. Bloor is at present in Ingersoll, visiting relatives.

LINKING UP VANCOUVER WITH MAIN LINE OF GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC

Splendid progress is being made on the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, which will link up the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Prince George with the city of Vancouver. The Pacific Great Eastern is at the present time operating a suburban train service between North Vancouver and the city, also at the present time carrying traffic between Squamish, at the head of Howe Sound, and Cheakamus, a distance of about eleven miles. The track on this latter section is now being extended northward. Grading between the end of track and Lillooet, where the line crosses the Fraser River, one hundred miles north of Vancouver, is practically finished, but on account of unfinished bridging it is not expected that track will be into Lillooet before late in the fall of this year. The entire balance of the line between Lillooet and Prince George is under contract, and it is expected that a force of 6,000 men will be employed to insure the earliest possible completion of the work. It is impossible to say yet when the line will be finished, although the engineers hope to have the line to Prince George graded by the end of this year.

BIG STEEL BRIDGE ON G. T. P. COMPLETED

Advice has been received in headquarters in Montreal that the Grand Trunk Pacific is now carrying passengers from Fort William to Prince George, B.C., over an all-steel bridge, a distance of 1,799 miles. As the steel bridge across the Fraser River at Prince George has now been completed, trains will run directly to and from Prince George station and no ferry transfer is necessary. The Prince Rupert eastward, passenger service is in operation to Priestley, 337 miles, and while steel is laid over the gap between Priestley and Prince George work is going forward to bring the roadbed up to the highest standard before inaugurating through passenger service between Winnipeg and the Pacific Coast terminal of the line.

HOME BANK REPORT

Shareholders Hear Good Report of the Past Year.

The annual statement of the Home Bank for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1914, was issued last Tuesday, the day of the annual meeting, and appears in the public press today. This statement of the Home Bank concluded the annual report for the various chartered banks of Canada for the past twelve months, and the first report for next year will appear in the winter months. From the annual statement which appears on another page it will be seen that the net profits for the year amounted to \$192,442.72, which is 10 per cent on the paid-up capital; \$65,000 has been written off the bank premises account, and the Officers' Pension Fund has a nucleus of \$10,000. The reserve has been brought up to one-third of the capital. It has been a year of normal progress for the Home Bank. The address of the president, Senator James Macdonald, reviews the financial situation in the same tenor that has characterized the remarks of bankers when addressing their shareholders at annual meetings during the past year.

A prominent grain grower from Winnipeg, Mr. John Kennedy, who is a director of the Home Bank, raised an important point at the meeting when he called attention to the loss grain growers sustain in being under the necessity of shipping their grain out of the country within a few months after harvest in order to secure ready funds for their needs. This led to a discussion of the foreign markets, in such quantities as were shipped in 1913, brought down the price of No. 1 Manitoba wheat 10 cents per bushel. Mr. Kennedy maintained that this profit went into the hands of foreign dealers, whereas it might have gone into the pockets of the grain growers if they could have held their grain and let it out gradually. He also suggested that if the banks would advance 50 per cent of the value upon grain that farmers had securely stored, there would be a saving of many thousands of dollars a year to the Canadian grain growers, both in the West and East, because the price of Manitoba wheat sets the price for all Canada.

The address of the president contained feeling references to the memory of the late Eugene O'Keefe, a lifelong associate of the Home Bank, and former president, who died in October last.

SIR A. CONAN DOYLE HAS GOOD SPORT IN ALGONQUIN PARK

Sir Arthur and Lady Conan Doyle who have been touring Canada as the guests of the Grand Trunk System, spent the week end in Algonquin Park, staying in "Nominigan" Log Cabin Camp on Smoky Lake, where they enjoyed the experience of being in the wilds of this magnificent region in a rustic camp equipped with all modern conveniences. They were delighted with their sojourn and enthusiastic as to the attractions and pleasures that are found in this wonderful territory. The weather was delightful and fishing all that could be desired. Some splendid catches were secured, among which was an eight pound black salmon trout landed by Lady Doyle. This is being mounted and sent to their home in England as a souvenir of the outing. Mr. G. T. Bell, Passenger Traffic Manager of the Grand Trunk System, and Mrs. Bell, met the party at the Highland Inn on the way out and spent a pleasant visit with them before they proceeded on their journey. Sir Arthur and Lady Conan Doyle will sail for England on the steamship "Meganitic" on July 4.

OFFICIALS DISPUTE CLAIM FOR DAMAGES

Commissioners "Pass the But-ter" to City Controllers for Collection Charge.

RAP GARBAGE QUESTION

Conflict of Authority Between Two Departments Delays Settlement of Claim.

Conflicting authority between the public utilities commission and the board of control continues to be more or less a bone of contention among the members of these different city boards, and informally at their meeting yesterday afternoon the commissioners "passed the butter" to the controllers and the council for the trouble over the garbage collection. Chairman Pocock declared that if the garbage question was not adjusted soon there would be a new council next year. The commissioners still resent the garbage tax of \$370, which was assessed on the Horton street plant and Victoria Park.

Commissioners Get Theirs. When Mayor Graham arrived at the meeting he demanded to know what the commissioners had done with the claim of S. Pocock, who wants \$25 damages for injuries he sustained several weeks ago when he was thrown from his motorcycle in riding over a depression in the road on Dundas street.

The claim was first filed against the city, but on looking it up, City Engineer Asplund discovered it was due to a cross trench to a water hydrant, and, therefore, up to the commissioners. Mr. Glauibitz disclaimed knowledge of the accident which Mr. Asplund said he had referred to the general manager. Chairman Pocock, a relative of the claimant, would not honor the claim until there was something definite before the commissioners. Mayor Graham instructed the city engineer to submit such matters in writing hereafter, so as to prevent any repudiation of oral or telephone communications.

To Buy a Horse. A report of the parks committee recommending the purchase of a horse was adopted. The purchase of electrical equipment amounting to \$4,764 was authorized.

HUSSAR BAND CONTEST DRAWS BIG ATTENDANCE

Hundreds of Citizens Visit Queen's Park—Many Autos Crowd Driveways.

The First Hussar Band discouraged variegated music to a large crowd of band concert lovers at Queen's Park last night. The attendance was larger than ever before at Queen's Park this season. From 8 o'clock until 10, every bench in the line around the bandstand was doing full duty. Hundreds of citizens formed a solid circle outside of them. East Londoners appreciate the opportunity given them to enjoy good music on a pleasant evening.

A feature of the Queen's Park band concerts is the large number of auto-lots attracted to the park, which is unlike Victoria Park, open to them. Scores of cars were on the grounds during the concert.

RAILROADMAN IS INJURED

Johnston Cummings Is Improving. After Being Thrown by Engine.

Johnston Cummings, East London, who narrowly escaped death when he was struck by an engine at Ingersoll on the C. P. R., is improving, and is reported to be resting easily in St. Joseph's Hospital where he was taken. Dr. W. J. Stevenson is in attendance.

SEEKING A SUCCESSOR TO HON. J. O. REAUME

Cabinet May Select a Minister of Public Works Next Week.

TORONTO, July 2.—All talk at the Parliament Buildings centres around the early retirement of Hon. J. O. Reaume as minister of public works. There was a full meeting of the cabinet, but Sir James Whitney declined to make any announcement at its close. "We talked over many things," he said, "workmen's compensation and similar subjects, but nothing definite was done. We expect to have a full meeting of the cabinet next Tuesday, when many matters of importance will be taken up."

In all probability there will be a cabinet reorganization. The portfolio of public work has traditionally gone to a member of the Roman Catholic faith. Who Dr. Reaume's successor will be is still in question, whether he would relinquish his law practice for a cabinet post. Among the ministers Hon. J. S. Hendrie is senior, but his private interests would militate against his accepting further ministerial responsibility. Hon. P. M. Preston is disinclined for inside work, but he might be induced to accept.

One of the first matters to be taken up is the appointment of the permanent committee to administer the Workmen's Compensation Act. This, judging from remarks made at the buildings today, will likely happen next week. The Government has the man in sight, and it is only waiting the proper time to make the announcement. In this connection, it might be said that a cabinet minister tonight said that Mr. Hanna would not leave his department for this work.

MILLION BUSHELS OF GRAIN GOES DOWN THE LAKE

Duluth, July 2.—At least 1,000,000 bushels of grain will go down the lakes in the next two weeks, despite the prevalent three-quarter cent rate, grain men predicted today.

The prediction followed a sudden rush of vessels to sign contracts. The movement will let stocks here down to three million bushels, and elevators will be in good shape to receive the new crop.

Five cargoes, aggregating nearly half a million bushels, have gone out in the last 24 hours.

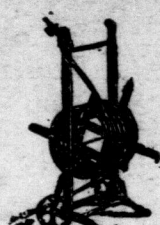
