ALLEGED VIOLATORS
OF O. T. A. WILL BE
TRIED MONDAY NEXTCase Against Men Caught
With Taxi-Load of Whiskey
Adjourned.

Hyman Ellich of Windsor, and Gerald Nicholson of Toronto, the two men who, through the clever work of P. C. Louis McCaughy and P. C. Roy Brammer, are in police custody charged with having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling, were in police court on Friday afternoon, and had their case adjourned until Monday. This was to permit them to secure witnesses from Toronto and Windsor.

These two men were en route from the Queen City to the Border City in an auto with a cargo consisting of 171 quart bottles of whiskey.

Nicholson, who is a Toronto taxi driver, will plead that he was ignorant of the nature of the load. The other man's defence will be that he had moved to Windsor and was transferring the liquor from one private residence to another.

The two men were convicted by a jury at the trial, which is a seven-day case, and the law makes this provision in order to prevent the unlawful transportation of liquor.

Alfred Judd is defending the men, and R. G. Fisher is prosecuting.

CHARMING PLAY OF

With so many musical comedies going the rounds these days that possess neither music nor comedy, it is something of a relief to be entertained in such a pleasing evening's amusement as "Fiddlers Three" supplies. Miss Deise made a distinct hit in solos and duets she was very effective.

In a day of plotless musical comedies it is refreshing to find that "Fiddlers Three" has a plot, and that the members of the company attempt to realize things as they are, and not as they are portrayed. This is one of the most pleasing things to record of the play, that as the parts demanded, so the actors endeavored to appear. Too many stage comedies merely act as clotheslines.

The story of the play is a romantic one, with a complicated love interest that pivots around a violin playing contest. The music is more ambitious way musical comedies; in fact, over-eta perhaps is the better name for fun throughout without any resort to vulgarity, and the chorus depends on its ability to sing and its ability to display the feminine form.
