# TWO ISOLATION WARDS AT VICTORIA HOSPITAL CLOSED

Dr. Downham Reports That They Will Be Opened When Conditions Warrant It.

Despite the fact that three cases of scarlet fever and one case of diphtheria have been detected in London during the past week, neither the diphtheria or scarlet fever wards at Victoria Hospital are open. This fact was announced by Dr. W. S. Downham, medical officer of health for London, Monday morning, who points out that these cases are being treated satisfactorily in their

However, as soon as conditions warrant it, the two wards will be opened at the isolation hospital and staffs placed on duty. In fact, one case, if removed to the hospital, will ecessitate opening up either ward. "We do not urge that scarlet feve or diphtheria cases be removed to the hospital so long as home conditions are favorable," said Dr. Downham, at home, we urge hospital treatment. The scarlet fever and diphtheria wards at Victoria Hospital are closed but if one case of either disease were to break out in the poorest family in London, and the hospital be recommended, the ward would be opened at
