

# MINISTERS ARE ENTERTAINED BY ORGANISTS' CLUB

Outline Relationship to Musical Program Carried Out in Church.

## VALUE IS STRESSED

An interesting meeting of the Organists' Club took place last evening. It was called "Clergymen's Night," when each member was requested to invite his clergyman or minister to be present. Quite a number responded, and these ministers with the members were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Wheeler for the evening at their home on Waterloo street. Dr. James H. Smith presided, and in a short opening speech welcomed the ministers present and requested them to feel perfectly free to express their opinions with regard to matters pertaining to the musical side of the church service. He then called upon Charles E. Wheeler, F.C.C.O., president of the Canadian College of Organists, to explain briefly the objects of the college. Having thus cleared the way, the chairman called upon the various members to introduce their own clergymen to the meeting.

The first was made by O. Leo Herbert, organist of Adelaide Street Baptist Church, who introduced the Rev. P. W. Holland, the newly appointed minister of that church. Other ministers who addressed the meeting were Rev. (Capt.) J. Garbutt of Dundas Centre Church, introduced by the organist, J. Parson Morris, A.C.C.O.; Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D., and also Rev. J. Harris of St. Andrew's Church, introduced by Charles E. Wheeler; Rev. A. Burgess of Eglinton Street Baptist Church, introduced by L. G. Starling; and Rev. J. T. Cosby Morris, B.A., B.D., of Askin Street Church, introduced by Dr. James H. Smith.

Following are extracts from the speeches: "I think it best to leave the musical part of the service to the organist. My place is to stay in the pulpit and I leave the organist to stay in his place. The preacher should not interfere with the music." "The ministers are greatly dependent upon the music. With the best should be a unit with no outstanding feature, all should be to help in the worship." "The music should be worshipful." "The organist and choir have always given me the atmosphere in which I can do my best preaching." "The same sort of people will not suit all people." "All folks are not the same; we should have the type of organist that best suits the people amongst whom we work." "Problem: How to get the people in church before the service starts." "Organists should be interested in the training of the child in the service of praise." "Is the song service really helpful in bringing the people on time?" "A man told me his minister always referred to the choir as the war department of his church, but I always refer to the choir as my auxiliary in the work of the church." "Overheard at the table: The dear fellow (minister) is so ignorant of music that he leaves us alone, and we get along splendidly." "I never had a row with a choirman or organist in my life." "I do not choose my hymns; I give the organist my subject, and he selects hymns suitable for the occasion."

During the evening refreshments were served by the hostess, and the ministers expressed themselves as being delighted with the warm reception given to them, and for the opportunity of discussing freely from their point of view the organist and choir.

## MATRICULATION WORK LIKELY TO BE CHANGED

Radical changes in certain branches of matriculation work are promised for the forthcoming school year, according to Dean W. Sherwood Fox of the University of Western Ontario, who returned yesterday from a committee meeting of university and high school representatives held in Toronto.

Both Dr. K. P. R. Neville, registrar of Western, and Dean Fox welcomed the meeting as the two representatives of the local university. According to Dean Fox, many proposals were made which, if adopted at a general conference to be held at Easter, will greatly affect the matriculation system in Ontario.
