POSITION OF FEET

"REACH" FOR BALL MORE THAN USUAL.

CLOSE FACE OF CLUB AT TOP OF SWING BY KEEPING RIGHT ELBOW POINTING TO GROUND.

HIT BALL FROM INSIDE LINE OF PLAY.

What are the important points in playing for a hook?

Answered by WM. MELBORN

"The St. Louis Youngster" whose battering courage and sound golf enable him to finish well up in all the tournaments he enters.

To begin with, place the left foot a little forward and the right foot back so that the left foot is about six or eight inches closer to ball than usual. "Reach" just a little more for the ball than usual.

"Close" the face of the club at top of swing by keeping the right elbow pointing to the ground and left elbow a little beyond the right. Then hit the ball from inside the line of play.

THE THORNY PATH.
Stratford has decided not to enter the Provincial Soccer League, and so far a solution has not appeared which will look after the situation the local Maple Leafs find themselves in.

If the Maple Leafs find a way out of the jungle of soccer legislation which hedges them on every side, the L. A. A. cannot very well turn a deaf ear to the local club's appeal for financial and moral backing. That is one of the purposes of the L. A. A.—to see that London is adequately represented in the broader fields of sport.

If the London and District Football Association fulfilled its role and all the towns in Western Ontario were in competition, there probably wouldn't be any call for the Provincial League here. However, with the W. F. A. still going fairly strong to the east, and Sarnia and Windsor lured into the Detroit soccer arena, the L. and D. does not face a prospect of very wide expansion.

Maple Leafs are too strong for the rest of the teams in the L. and D. and would not help that competition much. They approximate the Provincial League brand of soccer.

The introduction of the latter league into London should be a factor to stimulate a new interest in soccer, as in other branches of sport, would be. The ideal situation in soccer, as in other branches of sport, would be to have a representative city eleven playing in the fastest competition available and the London and District operating as it is at present, with the junior league in affiliation.

As it is, Londoners get only an odd glimpse of first division football, hanging upon the vagaries of the cup draws in which any L. and D. team might be entered. These competitions do not assure a steady diet of football calculated to build up a soccer following and an appreciation of better soccer. The Provincial League, if the brand of soccer it plays is as billed, would accomplish this end.

WILL FIND OWN LEVEL.

Because all the fighters in the past, as well as all the great artists and authors, have found their own way to the top, W. O. McGeehan, New York Herald sports editor, thinks that Tex O'Rourke's search for a heavyweight champion in the British Isles is a futile effort. CRICKET LEAGUE DRAFTS SCHEDULE

Southwestern Ontario Circuit Arranges For Seagram Trophy Competition.

Cricket will boom in this district this summer as it never did before. Judging from the enthusiasm shown at the meeting of the Southwestern Ontario Cricket League in the Tecumseh House here last night. An important step toward co-operating with the Western Ontario League was taken when the members unanimously agreed to continue the inter-league matches at the end of the regular season and also to combine with the other circuit to send a team to Toronto to play at all-Toronto eleven July 16, during cricket week in the Queen City.

A new trophy has been donated by Ed. Seagram of Waterloo, and the champions of the two loops will contest for this. Next season, however, the cup winner will be decided after an elimination series comprising all teams in both leagues.

The inter-league games this year will be held at Woodstock on June 25 and at Galt on August 13, with a third match on neutral grounds if necessary. A game with a Hamilton and District all-star team will be staged at Stratford, Sept. 10.

In regard to adopting the elimination system for the Seagram Trophy next year, it was decided to allow each team to enter or stay out as it saw fit, as the expenses of these games might be too great a burden for some of the clubs.

The teams which will make up the circuit this season are the same as last year: St. Thomas, Mitchell, Stratford, Woodstock and Ontario Hospital, London.

ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR FINALS IN WOSSA

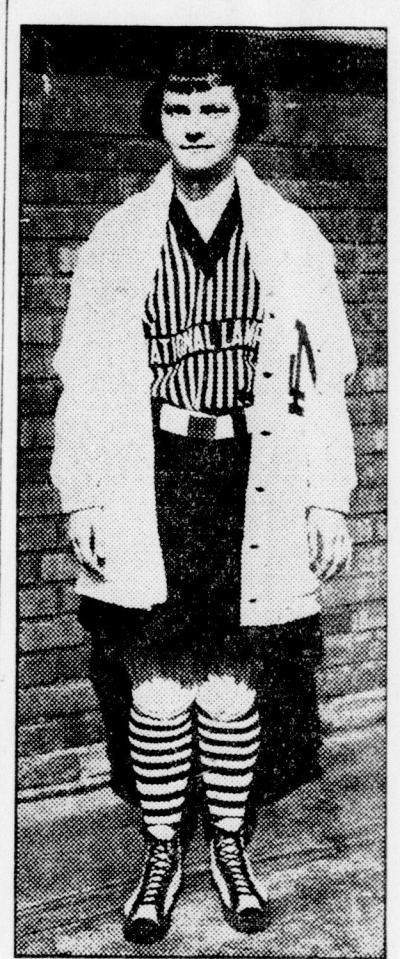
