

COUNCIL DENIED WORKERS' LIST

Education Board Sees No Object in Request For Information.

RUN OWN AFFAIRS

Some weeks ago the city council wrote the board of education requesting the names of all those employees living outside the city limits. The board countered by asking for further information on the subject. The reply sent by the council and tabled at the regular board meeting yesterday afternoon gave no further information than the council had simply reiterated the request for the list of names. That letter received scant consideration at the hands of the members of the board, who were practically unanimous in rejecting the dictation from the city council in the matter. Trustee Rev. R. D. Ness moved that the letter be filed and no further action taken.

Trustee Dr. A. J. Grant seconded that motion declaring that while the council had jurisdiction over certain things, in his opinion, it did not have any jurisdiction whatever in the matter under discussion. "I am not willing to come here and spend my good money to be used as a rubber stamp," he said. "I am not willing to be used as a rubber stamp for the board of education and we have gray matter and ideas of our own with which to run them."

Trustee A. N. Udy thought it would do no harm to supply the council with the list as requested. "But let it stop at that," he said. Trustee Rev. Quinlan Warner protested that he was "honestly in the dark" as to the reason the council desired the information. "I suggest," remarked Trustee Mrs. J. A. Rose, "that the council might want this information for the housing commission." (Laughter.)

"Chairman E. N. Campbell declared that should the council be given the list it would be of no value to them. 'They couldn't compel us to discharge any city limits,' he said, 'so it is really no use in giving them the information.'"

"The motion as moved by Trustees Ness and Udy was carried unanimously amid a chorus of 'file it,' from a number of the trustees."

MAYOR STANDS ALOOF ON PLEBISCITE ISSUE

But Denies Ordering Name Off Moderation List—Will Take No Active Part.

Yesterday morning in the newspaper advertisement of the moderation league the names of the London committee were published. Among those names was that of Mayor Wenige.

BOOK BROTHERS OF DETROIT TAKE \$15,000,000 INSURANCE

Find It Necessary to Apply For Policies on Two Continents.

ESTABLISHES RECORD

Detroit, Oct. 10.—The three Book brothers—J. Burgess, Jun., Frank P. and Herbert—today became the wealthiest insured men in the world, possessing policies totaling \$7,000,000, with \$8,000,000 more about to be issued. So big are the amounts asked on each brother that practically every company in America has been given a share of the business.

On the added \$8,000,000 the underwriters had to seek out the more important companies in Canada and Europe. Leo Thomas, insurance counselor, declared the policies, totaling \$15,000,000, make the Books the most heavily insured body of men anywhere in the world. Mr. Thomas is the underwriter. He called for the limit from every American company, and when the amount could not be reached here, Mr. Thomas went to Europe.

The life insurance policies were taken out to assure the completion of the Washington boulevard development, which in a few years has been transformed from an unsightly avenue to one of the most attractive boulevards of business in America.

Spiddle, who lives close by, and myself turned the car over.

"You can see for yourself that my car is a complete wreck, while the machine of Mr. Mathewson is just about as good. I can't understand why somebody wasn't killed. Working on the Pipe Line road as I do I am always careful about cars and coming out of my lane."

On Way to Fair.

High Constable Wharton was on his way to the fair, via a Pine Line road, and was at the brow of the Woodland cemetery hill when he saw the commotion ahead of him.

"The car came from the west and after the accident occurred was on the way to the hospital with Mary Mathewson, Mildred Lamont, Mary Cron and Muriel Luce.

"The girls were screaming with pain, badly bruised and cut, and I lost no time in getting them to the hospital," said the high constable. "The ambulance was phoned for, and took the others to the Victoria hospital in quick time."

Mr. Lawson received a smash on his head, and the car was badly damaged. The car was badly damaged and the driver, Mr. Mathewson, was injured.

Quick work on the telephone by Mr. Mills, bookkeeper at Victoria hospital, brought relatives of the girls to the hospital within an hour.

Mr. Mathewson motored to the scene of the accident and discussed it with Mr. Bouk, both hurrying on to the hospital a few minutes later. Neither man carried any insurance on his car.

Bruce Mathewson, 12 years of age, escaped with a few bruises and a rent in his coat.

Thought All Killed.

"Don't ask me about it," said Bruce. "I just know that it happened and that's all. The girls in the front seat were thrown against the windshield and I thought they were all killed. It made an awful noise and I thought the end of the world had come. Our car was all smashed in front. It was a good thing it was a touring car and not a closed one. I just shot out the side and landed in the ditch. The girls were all sort of humped up and they screamed."

Spiddle was picking apples just 100 feet from the accident when he heard the crash. He had noticed the car decked with collegiate pennants and colors. He estimated the speed at from 30 to 35 miles an hour while Miss Mathewson told the high constable on the way to the hospital that she was travelling at 25 miles an hour.

Flappers' Lead In Appeals To Place Name On Vote List

Young girls just emerging from their teens and becoming of age, are numbered amongst the keenest to vote in the coming provincial plebiscite on the liquor questions. Surveys show that they had a majority over other "classes" in the recent sitting of the voters' appeal court.

There were 2,500 names added to the lists during the 25 sittings of the court. Middle-aged and older men and women were included amongst the applicants, but they were in the minority. They had come to have their names put on because of changes in residence chiefly. The court has not been made of the names on the present lists. This work will be started this afternoon at the office of W. C. Fitzgerald, K. C., returning officer for London. Some 30,000 or more names are expected to be accounted for.

COL. BROWN LAUDS INSISTENT WORK

Tells Kiwanis Club of Work Accomplished by Citizens' Research Board.

C. OF C. CONCERNED

The citizens' research institute of Canada aims at a higher standard in government administration, particularly in regard to municipalities. The problem of municipal government is a serious one and battling to the people of the world.

The work of the institute was taken up by Col. Walter J. Brown, president of the chamber of commerce, who, representing that body, spoke to the Kiwanis club at the regular dinner at the Tecumseh house today.

Other speakers were Gordon Ingram, president of the chamber of commerce, and Arthur Ford.

Colonel Brown said that municipal expenses increased more rapidly than the populations of the various centers could serve. He quoted Dr. Upson, who had found four chief reasons for the increase.

First, the municipal bodies had taken on new duties. Secondly, there had been an extension of old services. Thirdly, the increased prices and higher salaries, and fourthly, the failure to develop a method of financial control.

The chamber of commerce concerned itself vitally with these things.

It had gone into it carefully and scientifically. The members had found that in 1921 the per capita expense was not greater than that of any other city except Ottawa. In 1922 the per capita expense had increased greatly since 1919. In 1919 it was \$26.14; in 1920, \$32.35; in 1921, \$30.50; in 1922, \$43.17.

The chamber of commerce was a self-appointed organization. The members work on problems confronting the city and the community. They are putting their business experience into the work.

Col. Brown then told of the hospital trust survey and the survey that was made in the civic departments. He said that a survey of the department of education had been authorized and the survey would be completed within a month. He felt that the survey of the civic affairs was probably the most important.

PROSECUTION NEARER TO SLOW PAY EARNERS

Assessment Commissioner Warns Income Returns Must Be Filed.

No charges of failure to file income tax returns have yet been laid by Assessment Commissioner H. J. Bennett, but Mr. Bennett stresses the importance of complying with the final notice to have returns in. Municipal income returns should have been filed out by ever gotten on April 30. Many are now nearly six months overdue. As much latitude as possible has been given.

Several hundred citizens, who have neglected to file returns, may be summoned to court, where they will go through inconvenience and expense and perhaps have to pay fines of \$100, plus \$10 a day for every day returns are overdue.

Means are available in the assessment office for checking up incomes, and false reports have been discovered in several cases, though some of them were the result of carelessness, and others did not claim exemptions to which they were entitled.

CERTIFICATES ARE GIVEN KIWANIAN BOY STUDENTS
