CANADIAN PARTY RECEIVED BY POPE

Hundred Pilgrims Present
Book of Lives of Eight
Beatified Jesuits.

BLESSES DOMINION

Rome, Oct. 20.—The pope today received 100 Canadian pilgrims, headed by Monsignor William Forbes, bishop of Joliette; Monsignor M. J. O'Brien, bishop of Peterboro, and Monsignor J. E. Limoges, bishop of Mont Laurier.

The pilgrimage included 30 priests and 20 zouaves. The latter carried the old pontifical flag used by the zouaves before the fall of the papal temporal power in Rome, and also the Canadian national flag, which will be laid in the sanctuary of Lileux.

The pilgrims presented the pope with a book containing the lives of the eight Canadian Jesuit martyrs, who were beatified in St. Peter's, Rome, on June 21 last, and to whose memory a memorial tablet was unveiled with impressive ceremony near Midland, Ont., on the same date. Fathers Jean de Brebeuf, Gabriel Lalemant, Antoine Daniel, Charles Garnier, Noel Chabanel and Isaac Jogues, and Lay Brothers Rene Goupil and John Lalande.

The pope blessed Canada in its entirety, and especially blessed the episcopate and the clergy. He said he was glad that he had beatified the Canadian martyrs and thus given new protectors to the Catholics in Canada.

BANKERS EXTEND CREDIT TO VATICAN

Receive \$1,500,000 To Establish Financial Relationship With Americans.

DIFFERENT PURPOSES

New York, Oct. 20.—A credit of \$1,500,000 has been extended by New York bankers to the Vatican to insure the Holy See against the fluctuation of European currencies, and to establish closer financial relations with the American hierarchy.

The loan was negotiated by the firm of Blair & Company, which together with the Chase National bank, will act as a depositary for the Vatican. Officials of both institutions withheld comment pending final completion of the deal.

LOAN NEGOTIATED.

Rome, Oct. 20.—A loan of \$1,500,000 has been negotiated by the Vatican with American bankers for the purpose of purchasing Villa Gabrielli, a large estate adjoining the Vatican. The new American college is to be erected on this property, and Monsignor Burke, rector of the American college in Rome, is now in America to complete arrangements for the new institution.

An effort was made to obtain a loan from Italian banks, but their rate of interest was considered too high.

PREMIER'S FISCAL RECORD ENTITLES PARTY TO RETURN

W. E. N. Sinclair Address
Ilderton Electors On Behalf
of Dr. Ross.

REVIEWS BENEFITS

Ilderton, Oct. 20.—The financial record of the King government during the past four years would also entitle it to re-election by acclamation throughout Canada, declared W. E. N. Sinclair, opposition leader in the provincial legislature, in an address at Ilderton last night in the interests of Dr. C. C. Ross, East Middlesex Liberal candidate.

In forceful addresses, Mrs. Annie Hall of Brampton and Dr. Clifford Reason of London also spoke in the interests of the candidate.

With a keen survey of the condition of the dominion at the present time, in comparison to years of depression prior to 1921, Mr. Sinclair reviewed the achievements of the King government in the field of its beneficial influence in the betterment of a nation.

Mr. Sinclair urged electors of East Middlesex to support Dr. Ross at the polls next week, pointing out that it was the duty of every true Canadian citizen to cast a vote for real parliamentary government.

Another question they have been presenting to the people in an unfair light is that of immigration to the king and country in battle.

"Another question they have been presenting to the people in an unfair light is that of immigration to the king and country in battle. They fall entirely, however, to tell us that the greatest period of immigration of citizens to the other side was in 1920—a time when the Right Hon. Arthur Meighen was prime minister of Canada.

"The King government has been in power for four years, and the Conservatives have been unable to definitely find fault with one Liberal policy, and at the election stage they have trumped up issues of their own."

Mr. Sinclair ridiculed Conservative optimism in their belief that they would sweep the country on election day.

"I cannot see any reason why the government of Mackenzie King will be defeated at the present time, and how the Conservatives will sweep the country is far beyond my comprehension."

Forecasts Prosperity.

Both Dr. Ross and Mr. Sinclair paid special attention to the forecasts of prosperity which had come from all parts of Canada, and declared they had not experienced "better times" since the war.

money will, of course, be in circulation," Mr. Sinclair stated. "But if the tariff is unduly increased it will act as a means of stagnation for the whole country."

"Despite what the Tories have been saying, conditions in Canada are much better than you and I know it," the candidate declared.

In addressing chiefly the women, Mrs. Hall urged them to exercise their franchise in the forthcoming election, declaring that it was their duty both to the country and the home, to vote for a national unity and Liberalism.

Dr. Ross outlined the policies for which he stood and his appeal to the electors. He told of the unwarranted extravagance which had been exercised during the regimes of Sir Robert Borden and Arthur Meighen, and challenged that not one accusation of extravagance could be made against the King government. In his characteristic virile manner he drew loud applause in his condemnation of Conservative "trumped up" issues.

Major Duncan Ross, chairman for the evening, and Dr. Clifford Reason, paid tribute to the life of the late Colonel Bart Robson, and expressed their sense of loss at losing a personality which for years had been outstanding in the community.

SEEKING MEIGHEN FOR QUEBEC VISIT

"Old Line" Conservatives Hope
To Induce Leader To
Come.

Montreal, Oct. 20.—Strenuous efforts are being made by the "old line" Conservatives of Quebec to have the party leader, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, pay a visit to this province, and there are still hopes that there will be a last-minute acceptance and a big public meeting in Montreal a day or two before the election.

Announcements from Toronto would tend to the belief that the Tory chief will avoid Quebec until after the election. Reports in some circles are that he has been "warned away" by the new Quebec Conservative leader, Hon. E. L. Patenaude.

Many prominent Conservatives are not taking kindly to the fact that Patenaude, strongly backed by a certain section of the Montreal press, is said to be endeavoring to shift the mantle of leadership to his own shoulders.

"It is definitely known that those 'old line' Conservatives, who are standing off from the campaign at the present time, have made arrangements that a huge mass meeting can be held in Montreal on Tuesday or Wednesday evening of next week in the event that the Conservative chief should change his program and accept their pressing invitation to come here.

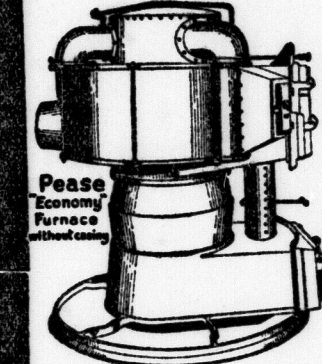
