If we are to believe the latest authorities on the subject, we find that women are much more tenacious of life and resist disease much more readily than the average man. She is in many respects the superior of the two.

As a rule, she does not expend her vital strength unnecessarily, while the majority of men either in work, in play, or in pleasure are literally prodigal of their store.

One writer has turned out some instructive comparative figures with regard to the liability of men and women to disease and death. He says from 3 to 35 years of age the death rate between the sexes remains about even, but afterwards the scale turns in favor of women. At 40 a woman has seventy-eight chances to one against dying, while man has only forty-nine chances to one At 60 the has seventy-eight chances to one against dying, while man has only forty-nine chances to one. At 60 the odds are nearly twice as large in favor of woman, and at 80 they are five times as great.
