COUNCIL BUYS MOTOR TRUCK

Fire Equipment to be Brought Up-to-Date—War Trophies For Campbellton.

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening His Worship Mayor Murray in the Chair with Councillors Dickie, Matthews, Devereaux, Ingram and Belle-Isle present. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

A communication was read from Poor Commissioner Wm. Savidant recommending that a bill of \$13. for board of one of the town charges be paid at \$11. On motion the Poor Commissioner's recommendation was adopted.

A communication was read from the Canadian Alio Chambers Co. stating that the electric motor rented by the town to drive the water pump had arrived back in good condition, and the Company would make no charge for the use of the motor. Clerk instructed to acknowledge receipt of letter and to thank the Company for their generosity in the matter.

A communication was read from Mr. D. K. Graham, Secretary of the L.O.L. of Restigouche protesting against one of the town policemen stopping innocent games at the 12th of July Celebration and asking for an explanation as to why it was done. Laid on table to be taken up later.

A communication was read from the Town Solicitor with reference to the desiring over to the town of a piece of land to widen Central street by the members of the Church of Our Lady of the Snows. The Solicitor pointed out the deed was given in good faith, but it appeared they had no authority to give it. Authority would be obtained for this at the next meeting of the Provincial Legislature when a legal deed would be accepted. Laid on the table.

A communication was read from the Sun Insurance Co. in connection with the temporary buildings vacated by the town on King street. The company claimed these buildings were badly in need of repairs, also that the grounds about them should be tidied up and kept clean. Laid on table.

His Worship the Mayor then read a letter received by him from the Department at Ottawa notifying the town that one 77m German Gun and four machine guns had been awarded Campbellton. The question of where these guns would be located on arrival here was left in the hands of the Educational and Improvement Committee.

His Worship received an urgent call and deputy Mayor Ingram was called to the Chair.

An application for a license to conduct a refreshment business from Geo. Dow was read, also an application from S. M. Moores for an auctioneer's license. Both applications were referred to the Police and License Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were then gone into and ordered paid.

The report of Mr. Tremblay, formerly Chief of the Montreal Fire Department, and Chief A. E. O'Donnell, who had been requested by the council to look into the needs of the Campbellton Fire Department was read. This report was a lengthy one, going fully into the necessary articles to bring our equipment to a high state of efficiency. The total cost of the material required was in the vicinity of \$5,000. A motor driven combination chemical engine and hose car, value \$3,150, was recommended. Extension ladders to the value of \$460, twelve salvage covers, \$50 each, twelve fire extinguishers for firemen's homes, \$16 each. Four of these extinguishers to be placed in each ward, so that firemen close to a fire and on the spot early may have an opportunity of doing effective work before the arrival of the department. Many other smaller but most necessary articles were recommended. There was much discussion over this report and the various items were carefully considered. During this discussion His Worship returned and resumed the chair. All councillors were in hearty accord with the report, and on motion it was decided to purchase at once the above mentioned articles, delivery to be made in thirty days time. WAR TROPHIES FOR CAMPBELLTON

German 77m Gun and Four German Machine Guns Now on Way Here.

It will be remembered shortly after the close of the war, His Worship Mayor Murray wrote the Department at Ottawa making application for war trophies. In acknowledging the receipt of His Worship's letter Lieut. Col. A. G. Doughty stated that at that time no promise of war trophies could be made, but his application would be kept in mind.

In February last His Worship again took up the matter of war trophies for Campbellton and several letters passed between himself and the Department in which His Worship put forth Campbellton's claim to receive at least some recognition for the service rendered, pointing out that Campbellton had supplied more men during the war than had any other Canadian town, according to population. Finally word was received that Campbellton would be awarded some war trophies.

On Saturday last His Worship received the following letter from Lieut. Col. Doughty which speaks for itself: **PUBLIC ARCHIVES OF CANADA**, Ottawa, July 23, 1920.

Sir,—
 In accordance with the distribution of war trophies approved by the Government, the Town of Campbellton has been allotted the following trophies:—
 One German 77m Gun, No. 2402, and four German Machine Guns.
 These trophies, which have been declared the property of the people of Canada, are sent to you with the understanding that proper care will be taken of them and in taking over these guns, it is understood that you agree to this condition.

The Mayor, Campbellton, N. B.
 Attached to this letter is the way bill showing that one German 7m Gun, No. 2402, and four German Machine Guns, Nos. 312, 4561, 4196 and 2269 had been shipped from Ottawa to the Mayor of Campbellton on July 21st last.

There were war trophies should reach Campbellton within a day or two, having as stated been shipped by freight on July 21st.

LIQUOR CASES UP FOR TRIAL

Some Activity in Prohibition Matters During Past Week—Fines Imposed.

It has been said that much liquor is offered for sale contrary to the Liquor Law, both in town and in the country districts. From the evidence at hand it seems that the assertion is all too true. We are glad to see that a start has been made to round some of these illegal dealers up.

Mr. John Morrissey of Dalhousie was on Saturday convicted of having liquor in a place other than his private dwelling and was fined \$75.00 and costs.

On July 16th, Arthur Brideau of Arsenau Siding was convicted of selling liquor without a license, and was fined \$90 and cost. Joseph Dion, of St. Quentin was also fined \$75 and costs for having liquor in a public place. Both these cases were tried before Justice of the Peace Somers at St. Quentin.

On Saturday Police Magistrate Matheson imposed a fine of \$75.00 and costs upon Joseph Labby of Arsenau Siding for selling liquor illegally. Fines were also imposed on Nicholas Roy, Mrs. Joshua Cooling and Mrs. F. Dugas, all of Ferguson Manor, for having their licensed beer premises open on Sunday.

An interesting case was before Police Magistrate Matheson Tuesday. The informant in the case Raoul Rochette had information laid against Adelaide Labby, Omerine Labby, Pea Beaulieu, Francois Beaulieu and Hilaire, who were accused of stealing or taking from the informant a quantity of liquor to the value of \$1,200. All the accused were sent up for trial. Several charges are being laid against informant relative to the prohibition act, as a result of the preliminary examination.

SHAMROCK LOSES CUP RACES

Resolute Wins Final Race of Series Tuesday Afternoon and Shamrock Wins Cup.

Shamrock's upset on Monday set the stage for a thrilling race on Tuesday afternoon. The Shamrock, which had taken the lead in the series today winning boat for boat thirteen minutes and forty-five seconds—and the America's famous yachting cup remains in the United States.

Overcoming a forty second lead the advantage of a windward berth which Shamrock had taken at the start, the defender held a lead of four minutes and eight seconds at the half-way stake of the thirty mile course, and crossed the finish line thirteen minutes and five seconds ahead. Including her handicap of six minutes and forty seconds, Resolute won by eighteen minutes and forty-five seconds.

As the challenger crossed the mark her British crew let out three ringing cheers for the victor, and the conquerors responded with lusty cheers for Shamrock and her crew.

BURNED UNDER PILE OF LOGS MAN HAS AMAZING ESCAPE

Caught in a little log cabin under a fall of heavy logs, toppling down from a cliff 50 feet above, is the plight and danger that faces William Duncan (Dick Darling) in the opening chapter of Vitagraph's latest serial thriller "Smashing Barriers," written especially for him. The situation comes here, not as the result of an attempt upon his life, but the unexpected result of a prank of lumberjacks who sought to try Duncan's courage on his first day in the camp. Gray in interfering with the playing of innocent games near the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital on July 12th was undertaken on his own responsibility and was not ordered or authorized by the Town Council or Police and License Committee or any person responsible thereto, and we regret that such an incident has occurred."

The hour being late council then adjourned.

EASTERN CITY ON VERGE OF STARVATION

London, July 28.—The city of Adana, in Asia Minor, with a population of 70,000 Christians and 10,000 Mohammedans, is entirely cut off from the outside world by the Turkish Nationalists and is on the verge of starvation, according to an official despatch received by the Armenian bureau from Larnaca, Cyprus, under Saturday's date.

TORONTO MEN CLAIM RE-DISCOVERY OF LOST PROCESS OF TEMPERING COPPER

Toronto, July 28.—Two local returned men, Lieut. David D. Dell and Private W. J.
