### PROGRESS IN I. N. R. DISTRICT

That wonderful strides have been made in agricultural development along the International Railway division of the C. N. ## U.S. HUNTERS GET 100 CARIBOU

Big Game Plentiful in Yukon—One Caribou Declared Largest Ever Seen.

Wrangell, Alaska, Oct. 10.—A caribou, killed by D. W. Bell, of Williams Port, Penna., member of a party from the eastern part of the United States that has just arrived here after a big game hunt into the Canadian country, across the Canadian boundary from Wrangell, was yesterday announced by experts as the largest specimen ever seen.

The party brought in more than one hundred caribou killed by the members. Many of these caribou were of a large size. R. N. Barnes, of Wrangell, killed a moose whose antlers had a spread of 61 1/2 inches. The large caribou obtained by Mr. Bell had antlers with thirty-eight points and with a spread of 55 3/4 inches and a length of 65 1/2 inches. It was of the ordinary species.

## HAS ENCOURAGING VIEW OF OUTLOOK

In Report On the General Trade Prospects of the Dominion

The Canadian Bank of Commerce in its monthly letter for October, takes an encouraging view of the outlook for trade in the Dominion. "The marketing of the crop is causing a slight revival of business throughout the Dominion," it says, "but there are no signs of unusual activity in any particular line, with the exception, of course, of transportation. All the resources of our railway and shipping companies will, in fact, be heavily taxed in carrying the season's gain crop to milling and consuming plants in the interior and to the seaboard. Manufacturers, however, while hopeful of the future, are not actually receiving orders in any volume to warrant the belief that business generally will be any more active in the near future than during the past few months. No doubt this steadiness of conditions is in a measure attributable to the determination on the part of the public to liquidate obligations carried over from the years immediately succeeding the war rather than to incur new debts. Creditors are carefully watching the course of harvest operations with a view to collecting overdue debts as soon as this is possible. They feel no doubt that in past years too much credit has been given, and their opinion is borne out by a number of readjustments that are now taking place in the commercial and financial world. Meanwhile there continues to be no lack of employment and business generally appears to be fundamentally sound, as evidenced by the volume of railway traffic, the size of the bank clearings and the decrease of number of commercial failures."

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## KING SPEAKS ON EMPIRE FAIR

Premier MacKenzie King Says Empire Should Develop Industrial Type of Society

London, Oct. 7.—Speaking of the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley Park yesterday afternoon, Premier MacKenzie King of Canada, urged that the exhibition should represent the British Empire in miniature.

"All through the history of nations," said Mr. King, "two antagonistic types of activities have struggled for the ascendancy—militant and industrial. The world has had its greatest object lesson in the outcome of the former within the recent past. In this exhibition we would have an object lesson of the possibilities of the latter."

"We of the British Empire would have the world witness here the limitless possibilities for progress and plenty of the arts of peace. To develop the industrial type of organized society to its highest possibilities should be the aim of our combined British communities. As we accept that end—and vast contribution toward it will be made by this exhibition—we shall make our contribution of permanent value not only to our empire alone but to the well being of mankind."

The Duke of Devonshire, Secretary for the Colonies, who presided, said that the intention of the board of the exhibition was to make the exhibition British in the widest sense of the word.

In submitting a message of greeting to the Prince of Wales at Ottawa, the Duke of Devonshire observed that he knew E. P. Ranch, Alberta, perhaps better than anyone present, adding: "If I had my choice I should be there today."
