BONAVENTURE COUNCIL SEMI-ANNUAL SESSION

Usual Business Transacted and Resolutions Were Passed—Other Business

A General Meeting of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure was held at the town of New Carlisle, on Thursday the 9th day of March, 1916, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon. The following were present:—F. X. Chapados, Esq., Pro-Warden and Mayor of Gascons; Mayors Louis Roy, St. Jean, "Evangeliste," Pierre Darche, Port Daniel East; Angus Campbell, New Richmond; J. Adhemar Cyr, Maria; Pierre Ferlatte, Caplan; E. J. Briard, New Carlisle; Edouard Martin, Carleton; S. M. Adams, St. Laurent of Matapedia; John Oatman, Restigouche South, East Part; Alexander Forbes, Escuminac; F. G. Scott, Paspebiac; Thomas Levesque, St. Alexis of Matapedia; John T. Daigneau, St. Omer; T. R. Busted, Manny; Alexis Arsenault, Bonaventure; Eugene Angellard, St. Godfroi; Alexis Poirier, St. Simeon; W. J. McKee, Hope; Levi Beebe, Port Daniel West, the whole forming a quorum under the provisions of the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec.

In the absence of Dr. H. J. Martin, Mayor of Carleton and Warden of the County, Mr. F. X. Chapados, Mayor of Gascons, and Pro-Warden of the County took the chair, and called the meeting to order.

The Secretary Treasurer gave communication to the Council, of a letter received by him from Dr. H. J. Martin, Mayor of Carleton, and Warden of the County tendering his resignation as County Councillor and Warden, and for the reasons therein stated, as follows to wit:—

Carleton, 28th Feby., 1916.
To Messrs. the County Councillors of the County of Bonaventure, Gentlemen:—

"The actual circumstances and my professional duties not allowing me to fulfil, as I would wish, the obligations of a Municipal Council Councillor, I deem it proper to give my resignation. You may rest assured that I shall never forget the good terms that have always existed between us during the twelve years that I have the honor to be your colleague. Please, gentlemen, accept my sincere thanks for the honor granted me as the Warden and President of your County Council. Allow me in bidding you adieu, to wish that all your deliberations shall always be the result of very serious consideration, and shall always be in the general interest of our beautiful country.

Mayor F. X. Chapados, the Pro-Warden, in well chosen words voiced the unanimous sentiment and appreciation of the retiring Warden's letter of resignation and the terms thereof calling particularly to the attention of the County Council, the valuable services and wise counsel given to the Council by Dr. H. J. Martin during his twelve years of faithful occupancy of the Municipal offices of County Councillor and Warden, to be gratefully remembered by the Council.

Whereupon the following resolution was unanimously passed and adopted by the Council, as PROPOSED by Mayor Daigneau, and SECONDED by Mayor Busted, to wit:—

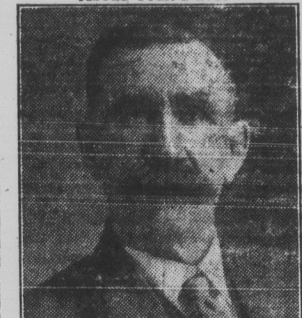

Mayor S. M. Adams of St. Laurent of Matapedia, was elected Warden of the County, upon the motion of Mayor Darche, seconded by Mayor Roy.

Mayor S. M. Adams was then administered the oath of office as Warden for the current term, by the Secretary-Treasurer, and took the chair of office.

Proposed by Mayor Oatman, seconded by Mayor Daigneau, that a copy of the present Resolution be sent to the said Honorable Minister and to the said Mr. F. Bueaud, AD- OPTED UNANIMOUSLY.

The Council re-considered the matter of the Morin children, and the costs of their maintenance at the reformatory school, and after a satisfactory explanation of the same from Mayor Chapados, the question was closed.

RECEIVED LETTER FROM LATE LIEUT. FERGUSON

Writes of Effects of War and Wars Outlook.—Canadians Part

On the day on which news of the death of Lieutenant H. W. Ferguson of the 26th battalion was received, a letter from him reached Rev. T. P. Drumm, of Moncton. He wrote:

"February 26, 1916.
"My dear Mr. Drumm,—The fact that I have been so tardy in answering your letter which reached me some time ago doesn't at all mean that I wasn't pleased to get it. It was most heartily appreciated and I should like you to write often regardless of the fact that some of them may seem ignored. Such most assuredly would not be the case, but facilities for letter writing and the necessary time to do it aren't always at one's disposal, consequently many of our home friends suffer in consequence.

"Suffer" is hardly the word, is it? One might almost say they're in luck some times at not being obliged to wade through several pages of illegible, unintelligible scrawling. However, when they write to us and we like to get their letters, they are sure to be burdened or, in consequence, 'Suffer' first is better there, isn't it? Because we're bound to get time to answer occasionally. Thanks awfully for the dedication programme which you enclosed with your letter and which I am enjoying perusing immensely. The old familiar hymns brought back to me my old choir days, good old days, and made me wonder if things would ever readjust themselves as of yore. Really you know at the present moment that seems almost like an impossibility. At times it seems as though the present struggle is changing things so that life afterward can never seem the same. I suppose that is only the natural outcome of such a war of extermination as this.

"We feel sure that victory will rest with the arms of the Allies, but the price to be paid is tremendous, and staggering in its immensity and such a cost cannot be paid without leaving lasting effects upon the nations that pay. Money does not matter. It is the blood price, the nation's best that does. The nation's best are here or are coming up day after day, and he who in this hour will not bear a man's burden or an empire's responsibilities is little short of a traitor to the name of man. War is not a pleasant spectacle to contemplate especially such a war as this, which so often narrows down to little, less than murder and slaughter, but Britain's share in it is necessary, if the world is to remain free from the wanton oppression of Germany's martial heel. And so a man who may be a really and truly 'conscientious objector' may enter with an easy conscience.

"None of us here feel any easy airy optimism of a whitening finish. That feeling does not really come to one out here after months of standing in front of the business ends of all kinds of guns and peering over and between strappings in line after line of twisting paths in the earth over the way there with entanglement after entanglement of barbed wire of all descriptions so thick in places that one cannot see through it. They across the way see the same thing, when they look over at us, and so we sit tight, not knowing the instant a 'heavie' is going to shift our particular part of Belgium to 'parts unknown.' With them it is vice versa and so the war goes on. Occasionally riding parties cut through wire and an interesting set to results. Our patrols and German patrols clash in 'No man's land' and fight it out among themselves. Our machine guns and their cross fires and sweep all the ground between and behind the trenches intermittently, as a gardener waters his plants with a hose. Captain B. Bainsfather has published a book of drawings called 'Fragments from France' in which humor is uppermost in situations which at the time of happening do not seem mirthful occasions. I have ordered several copies, one of which is to be sent to you. I know you'll enjoy it. Bainsfather has been out here in the middle of the game for a long while and his touch is local color, or is the best yet in humorous drawings of actual war drawn with a thorough understanding of human nature.

"And now, Mr. Drumm, I hope you'll drop an occasional line now and then 'frase Auld Lang Syne' telling me how you all are keeping. Kindest regards and best wishes to Mrs. Drumm and yourself and Jimmie.
