ALL AMERICAN ARCHBISHOPS.

Their Graces Summoned to Rome for Consultation.

Chicago, June 14. - A statement is published here that Archbishop Feehan, his coadjutor, and the other archbishops in America, have been called to Rome by the pope to consult with reference to the proposed plenary council for this country, to consider matters of church polity and discipline in America. It is not definitely known, but it is supposed the council will consider the relations which the church should assume towards the members of the Irish national league of America. The archbishops are to appear in Rome in September.

A BANQUET TO BRIGHT.

Lord Granville on English Relations with the United States.

London, June 14. - John Bright was tendered a complimentary banquet at the town hall at Birmingham this evening, at which were assembled many distinguished gentlemen. Lord Granville, in proposing the health of Mr. Bright, referred to the eminent services of that gentleman on various public questions, and said in reference to his Bright's relations with the United States: "In the official position which I hold, I am particularly alive to the very kind and friendly language expressed by Mr. Bright and others as to the friendly character of the United States, and in the promotion of the excellent relations which, without doubt exist now, but at any other time, exist between the two nations."

THE LATEST MURDER SOCIETY.

An Association Formed in Dublin for the Removal of Infirmers.

Dublin, June 14. - It is believed the police are cognizant of the fact that a society has been formed here for the purpose of removing informers who testified at the late trials, particularly James Carey. The house in which the society held its meetings has been closely watched. A raid was made recently on the house, where it was supposed a meeting was being held, but no arrests were effected.

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STAR ROUTERS ACQUITTED.

A VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY RETURNED BY THE JURY.

Extraordinary Cases in Court - Both Jurymen Waived as Heretofore - Arrangements to be Pressed.

WASHINGTON, June 14. - You can ask that jury whether they are glad to see the defendant made to the court said Judge Wylie to the jury when the court resumed this morning. The case was returned with a message that the jury desired to communicate with the court. They filed into the court room, apparently none the worse for their long confinement. The foreman stated the verdict was not guilty, immediately the decorum of the court of justice was forgotten, and cheers resounded from all quarters of the crowded room.

FIFTY THOUSAND SHORT.

The Winnipeg Bankers Go Wrong Through Speculation.

Winnipeg, Man., June 14. - Col. Kennedy, city registrar and a director of the Merchants' bank here, is \$50,000 short in his accounts. He has indulged in speculation, which has been going on for three years. Yesterday he refunded \$12,000 to the government, and all his real estate has been transferred to the government for the balance. He has a large number of shares in the bank, which he has sold.

CANADIAN TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Grand Trunk elevator at Sarnia has been leased by Mr. P. B. Sanborn of Port Huron for a term of years. New machinery will be added.

The crew of the corvette Canada on the Prince George, the second son of the Prince of Wales, on a midshipman, was expected to arrive at Halifax from Portsmouth the first week in July.

The corvette Yantic, which is to act as a conveyer to the steamer Proteus, on the Great relief expedition, sailed from New York for St. John's, Nfld., yesterday. Lieut. Garlington and his men were aboard.

THE ISLAND LICENSES.

Resolutions of the Licensed Victuallers - The Ontario branch of the Ontario Trade Benevolent Association held yesterday afternoon the following resolution on motion of A. C. Hodge was unanimously carried: That we, the members of the Toronto branch of the said association, at the very first opportunity offered to us would re-consider the license system in the city of Toronto to re-consider their decision as to their refusal to grant any licenses on the island beyond three months from the 1st of May in favor of Edward Hodge, who has been granted a license which he keeps a hotel at the west point, which supplies meals and lodging to any person who wishes to stay at the hotel.

UNION WEARERS NEWS.

A Toronto passed over Long Island yesterday, causing considerable destruction. Two hundred and fifty students graduated at Columbia college, N.Y., yesterday. Arrangements are about to be made for the exportation of American whisky in bond to Bremen and Hamburg.

Wanted - A Peacemaker.

London, June 14. - Lord Granville, it is stated, has offered to mediate between France and Madagascar. Mr. Tseou, French minister to England, who is intended to go to Ill-beah, to leave London to-day, has for important diplomatic reasons postponed his departure to the week. He has recently had a lengthy interview with Lord Granville.

A Disgraced Hisman.

New York, June 14. - W. M. Farwell has addressed a letter to the national Irish association asking for an investigation of the charges made against his character by the late John Bodley. He claims that no private outside the State of New York can obtain redress from the directors of the association, and he will try the effect of a mandamus to obtain his rights.

TORONTO COLLEGIATE AMATEURS.

A good deal has been said about Toronto collegiate institutes and its facilities for teaching classics to girls. As to the general efficiency of the school, there can be no question; and the thoroughly trained pupils and their record at the university and the other public examinations, are not equalled by any other institute in the province.

THE ONTARIO Jockey Club.

The annual meeting of the club for the election of directors and the confirmation of the rules took place yesterday afternoon at the Queen's hotel. Col. Gopinski presided and the president on the ground that he was too busy to attend, he asked that the club, in its capacity as a public body, should be dissolved.

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Both animals in yesterday's match, the record of which, by the way, is on our third page, are seven years old. The winner, Bonnie Bird, is a yellow bay mare, with a white blaze, and stands 15 2. She has a good development of quarters, and a mass of remarkable endurance and constitution.

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CHURCH COLONIZATION.

The Matter Before the Anglican Synod.

Divergent Opinions Expressed Thereon - A Memorial from the Dominion Alliance, on the suppression of the liquor traffic was read, confirmed and referred to the committee.

The subject of the proposed church of England colonization company for the planting of a colony in the Peninsula range was brought up and discussed.

Mr. Howland was sorry the committee had not been successful in carrying out their scheme so far - the government having changed their policy with regard to giving North-west lands to such undertakings, but he trusted the synod would not relinquish the scheme, as the land would be taken up rapidly as soon as offered. He thought the acquisition of good land was the first foundation of success.

Rev. J. P. Lewis said he was thankful the committee had not succeeded, for he considered that though the land was good, yet people who had spent thousands of dollars in that part of the country were leaving in hand and would be glad to get 50 per cent on their investments. He instructed a widow lady in this city who had lost heavily. He further stated that all the population were all going further west toward the Rocky mountains, and that before the land could be disposed of it would be taken up by tax.

The reports of the printing and church music committees were read and adopted. Rev. Mr. Langtry read the report of the committee on "Religious instruction in public schools." In moving its adoption he said they were in a more hopeful condition towards raising their standard in the past. He thought the matter ought to be pressed, as it was of the greatest vital importance.

Rev. Mr. Allan said he hoped the synod would do their utmost, so that the bible might be read daily in the public schools.

Rev. Mr. Allan thought that the clergy, as a class, kept aloof from the schools when it was their duty to visit them. His lordship said that in his own experience, when he was a curate in London, it afforded him much pleasure to visit the schools for an hour or so in the morning or afternoon and was sure to receive a most valuable influence over the scholars.

The Bishop read a letter from Mrs. Robinson inviting the clergy to a reception at government house, which was received with applause. It was resolved to adjourn an hour earlier in the afternoon on account of this.

Another communication was received from the Toronto Methodist Institute, placing the reading room at the disposal of the synod.

In the afternoon a hot discussion took place concerning terms of prayer for rogation days, which ended in a motion being brought forward requesting the bishop to order a suitable form of prayer to be used and low church as their customers. But beneath all this distinction of dress the men would be found pretty much half-a-dozen of one and six of the other.

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
