His Imperial Majesty Wept.

London, March 16.—On Sunday morning the Czar had no suspicion of any danger whatever. He had been congratulated by Gen. Gresser upon his continued safety. Report That Canada Proposes a Fish-New York, March 16.—An Ottawa despatch says the Canadian Government eight weeks don a proposition which, it was suggested, should be sent to the United States Secretary of State by the English authorities, suggesting a modus vivendi for the settlement of all differences between the British North American possessions and the United States. It is suggested that in order to settle all difficulties Canada submits that Great Britain should at once propose to the United States the settlement of all questions without reserve, by the appointment of a commission to consist as follows: One delegate to be named by the Governor and Council of Canada; one from Newfoundland by and with the consent of Great Britain; two from the United States, and one from some independent European power. The Liberals were all agreed upon a general policy and desired a similar agreement with reference to Ireland. He repeated that the Gladstone bills were dead and buried, and could be ignored. He believed there was very little real difference between Lord Hartington's conditions for the settlement of the Irish question and those which Mr. Gladstone enunciated in Parliament; but the latter, the Unionists thought, were not sufficiently embodied in Mr. Gladstone's bills. He never expected that the leaders who had been separated from the Liberal party by their objection to Gladstone bills would return to that party unless their objections were definitely met, but he cortainly believed it possible to reconcile the differences and to deal with the Irish question in a manner more thorough than the half-hearted style of the Conservatives.
