#### INGERSOLL'S LECTURE STOPPED.

#### THE MILLER CONFERENCE.

Washington, Feb. 23.—Mr. Wolcott (Rep., Cal.) gave notice of an amendment to the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill, providing that whenever the President of the United States, on the invitation of the Government of Germany, of Great Britain, or of any of the Governments of Europe, shall determine that it is expedient to hold an international conference for the purpose of settling the relative value between gold and silver as money by means of a common ratio between those metals with free coinage at such ratio, he shall be authorized to require the attendance of nine commissioners, to be appointed as follows: Three by the President, and with the advice and consent of an Senate; three members of the House of Representatives, and three senators of the next Congress; appropriation, \$100,000, for the pay and expenses of the commissioners and for the share of the United States in the expense of the conference.
