ARRIVAL OF THE TEUTONIA.

New York, Jan. 26. The steamship Teutonia arrived this evening, bringing London evening papers of the 7th instant. The funds were firmer in London on the 7th, but business was quiet. Exchange on Austria had risen in consequence of the renewed disquietude which prevails at Vienna.

ARRIVAL OF THE NOVA SCOTIAN.

PORTLAND, Jan. 23. The steamship Nova Scotian from Liverpool on the 11th, via Queenstown on the 12th instant, has arrived. The news is unimportant. A Paris dispatch says it was becoming every day more doubtful whether Congress would assemble; and the Paris correspondent of the London Times says the chances of the Congress meeting are of the most shadowy kind.

A French journal, the Opinions, believes that if Italy decided for the annexation of the North and centre of the Italian peninsula, England would gladly accept the combination, whilst France would accept with still greater eagerness, on condition that Savoy and Nice would be restored.

The Opinions does not anticipate that the Cabinet of Turin would object, and after signing that neither Austria, Russia, nor Prussia, has the power, will or right to interfere, says that this combination is seriously entertained by the Governments of London and Paris.

HOME MADE LOCOMOTIVE.—It is to be regretted that the private firms which entered upon the construction of locomotives have been unsuccessful. Whether this has arisen from want of experience or want of capital we cannot say—perhaps each has had some influence in bringing about the result.

Charges were rife against Austria of disguised intervention in Italy. The Austrian Government had ordered Prince Metternich to declare to the French Cab. that they would decline entering into negotiations on any other basis than agreement of Villa Franca or Treaty of Zurich.

The organ of the Ministerial party in Prussia is still opinion that the restoration of Dukes in Italy would have been most desirable solution but gives up the project as impossible, and thinks the annexation to Sardinia by far the next best thing. Prussia had submitted the system for common defence.

The public openly speak of the propriety of selling Venetia. Some Government employees have received orders not to take part in public conversation respecting the events of the times.

NOTES FOR THE MONTH.

LITTLE can be done in the garden or orchard during the month of February. Old apple trees that have become jense and twiggy, may be thinned out at any time. Scions may be cut; the winter pruning of the grape should be done towards the end of the month.

DOUBLING THE CROPS.

With too many farmers, the acres in possession do not come nearly up to the productiveness which might be attained. "Doubling the crop" would be thought a very simple undertaking by the progressive farmer. He would merely add sufficient labor in the preparation of the soil to give the product to which he would devote it a fair chance—depth of soil, appropriate fall freedom from weeds, &c.—and the yield would be doubled at once.
