HOW TO RAISE POTATOES WITH NEWEST SCIENTIFIC METHODS (By Edward R. Hewitt.) Mr. Hewitt is a son of the late Mayor Abram S. Hewitt, a grandson of Peter Cooper, the philanthropist, and a brother of Peter Cooper Hewitt. He was educated as a chemist in Germany, and is a skilled engineer. From the point of view of a chemist and engineer he is reclaiming his farm, Wewappo Farm, at Midvale, N. J., which was under cultivation before the Revolution. He is enriching the ground and developing the machinery on a scientific scale, demonstrating how abandoned farms can be made to pay. Besides correcting the acidity of the land and the lack of humus, he is using machinery, so that the cost of labor will not take all the profits of the farm.

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
